Crisis in Israel: How Can We Help?

Despite a significant rise in antisemitic feelings, openly-expressed beliefs, and actions in the United States over the last decade or so (with the 2017 Charlottesville rally of the "alt-right" shouting "Jews will not replace us" looming in many of our minds as the epitome of this phenomenon), nevertheless, Jews have flourished in this country. And we have *loved* America.

Thus as we prepare to celebrate our *getting out* from one country – Egypt – a less-than happy diaspora-situation, I want to pose the question: *what is it that we love about the United States?* Is it just that we were born here, that it is the only land we have ever really known as a home? Is it that this nation and culture have given us ample opportunities to establish ourselves in our work and in other ways as well: granting us and our children freedom and for the most part fairness and safety in the public square? Or does it go deeper than that? Do we love America because of its founding ideals, those inscribed in the Declaration of Independence, in the Constitution and the Bill of Rights? Do we cherish our American form of government: a democratic republic with strong checks and balances?

When the State of Israel was founded in 1948, its founders drafted and signed a Declaration of Independence, but for a number of reasons, never got around to creating a constitution. This partly had to do with the feeling that the many more people that were expected to immigrate to Israel should have a voice in its creation; but also with the fear that in the process of trying to draft a constitution, the cleavage between secular and religious parties would create too much disunity (with some of the religious parties saying that Israel already had a constitution – the Torah!). Nonetheless, I would venture to say that for the majority of *American* Jews, it has always been a point of pride for us to say that "Israel is the only democracy in the Middle East."

Because of the democratic character of Israel, the United States and Israel have always been natural allies. But just as the United States is not a simple democracy (with our checks and balances and our Bill of Rights safeguarding civil liberties and minority rights), Israel, despite its absence of a constitution, has thus far functioned as a democracy with the checks and balances of its independent judiciary. With Jews making up about 74% of Israel's population, it is vital that the rest of Israel's population (21% Arab and 5% "other") know that their civil and human rights will not be trampled upon by a change in the law which might allow a *majority* to impose its will upon their civil rights.

Likewise, secular, non-Orthodox (and liberal Orthodox) Israeli Jews do not want to have their rights to live freely taken away by ultra-Orthodox parties that have aligned

themselves with the party in power, holding it hostage to an ultra-Orthodox "wish list" of legislation. Thus the "crisis of democracy" in Israel today. Over the past number of weeks, hundreds of thousands of Israelis have been turning out again and again (Israel's biggest demonstrations *ever*) to protest the proposed changes to the balance of power between Israel's judiciary and its elected government, changes that would grant the ruling coalition the power to overrule the courts, even if their parliamentary majority wins by only one vote.

Israeli author Yossi Klein Halevi (with whom Rabbi Mark and I have both been in correspondence), was recently interviewed by Judi Rudoren (the Forward's editorin-chief) for her weekly online newsletter, her essay being titled: "What should American Jews do about the assault on Israeli democracy?" It is likely that Rudoren chose to talk to Yossi because he is well-known as a political moderate, someone who takes Israel's security concerns especially seriously. "Yossi is a political centrist," writes Rudoren, "and he is one of the most insightful people I know about all things Israel. He was there that Saturday night in Tel Aviv [in a recent protest where 80,000 Israelis stood in a heavy downpour for hours to protest the proposed legislative changes]... as he has been every week, the first street protests he's joined since his bad old days as a right-wing radical." (In his youth in the U.S. Yossi had been a member of the Jewish Defense League, founded by Meir Kahane.)

Yossi, on Zoom, tried to articulate the emotional effect protesting with tens of thousands of other Israelis had on him that night: "I have never been so drenched in my life — and I have never felt so moved. It was one of the most powerful Israeli experiences, spiritual Israeli experiences, that I've ever had...Everyone was drenched to our underwear. And there was this sense of 'We're not moving.' Suddenly, you looked around and you felt this sense of uplift."

When Yossi made *aliyah* to Israel (in 1982), it was during the first Lebanon war, a low point for the country in terms of divisiveness. But what is happening today, Yossi told Rudoren, is worse, with a government that poses "an existential threat, no less than a military threat" to the survival of the nation:

"It's taken a while, for understandable reasons, for American Jews to catch on, that what's happening in Israel is not just another policy debate, but that this is a life-anddeath issue for Israel."

I report Yossi's words here with great sadness – and with trepidation, for I know that many of you will be upset to hear such sentiments. But Yossi is pleading with American Jews to neither turn away from Israel nor to close our eyes to what is happening and "see no evil." He says that Israel needs committed diaspora Jews to be a part of this conversation. His final words to Rudoren were:

President's Message

One of our members told me, "The Temple felt like a synagogue should feel this past Shabbat, with people davening and breaking bread together."

Sylvia Eisner and Nancy Seibert have also been organizing a simple kiddush afterward, which brought back even more normalcy to Shabbat. The plan is to pick a Shabbat each month to continue this new tradition. Please plan to join us so we can always chant Torah on these special days. We are hoping to have another minyan on Shabbat morning, April 29th.

And please join me in welcoming Nancy Seibert to our congregation. Besides studying for the Torah readings she has been a regular attendee at our services, despite having to drive in from her home in Narragansett, RI. Welcome Nancy!

The other event we have in the planning stages is a celebration of Temple Beth El's 95th Anniversary. It is hard to believe that the 75th anniversary was twenty years ago. More news will be forthcoming, but we hope you will consider coming to the Temple to celebrate with us.

Lastly, I am happy to welcome in spring. Seeing the flowers blooming is such a wonderful sign of renewal. Happy Passover to all!



May peace and justice flourish in the land, and may Israel and all her bordering nations be led to seek peace together for the good of all their peoples, indeed, for the peace of the whole world. 

Mark Elber's Headstone


