### A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

The Radical Power of Hanging Out

Perhaps every generation feels this way, but it seems to me that we live in especially "fraught" times. As I write this column, a report has just been released by the Department of Justice on what went wrong at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas, back in May of 2022. Nineteen children and two teachers lost their lives that day, while the 376 law enforcement officers that descended upon the school remained outside the classroom where those innocents were gunned down – and yet the Texas state legislature is still refusing to pass a bill that would raise the required age in Texas for purchasing a semi-automatic rifle from 18 to 21. (The gunman at Uvalde was 19).

Meanwhile, in Israel/Palestine, peace seems as elusive as it has ever been – with much of the world accusing Israel of intentional violations of human rights and even "genocide" – while Hamas, for its part, is still refusing to release over 100 hostages (some of them elderly, women, and children), and, by many reports, seizing most of the humanitarian aid that makes it into Gaza for themselves and their fighters, leaving civilian Gazans to starve.

There is, of course, still much *good* in this world. There are wonderful, kind, courageous and generous people who give of their time and their talents to try to make this world a more beautiful place, to make life fairer and safer for everyone – and in some cases, for all God's creatures.

Depending on where you look, you may be inclined to feel dispirited and pessimistic about the world today – or hopeful and inspired. What seems important to me, when trying to maintain a balanced view of the world, is remembering what it is that makes our time on this earth worthwhile. What is deeply meaningful to us? What brings us joy?

As much as we may want life to be "fair" for all people (though my mother always told me, "don't expect life to be fair"), sometimes we have to "lighten up," and allow ourselves to simply enjoy the company of friends and family: to have a meal, enjoy a lively discussion, take a walk, play a board game or go bowling together – possibly going for hours without checking our phones!

This past summer I read a book by Sheila Liming (a creative writing professor at Champlain College with whom Lev is studying this semester) called

Hanging Out: the Radical Power of Killing Time (2023). I don't remember now many specifics of Liming's book, but the basic message was that our lives have become too crowded with anxiety-producing content and appointments, and that people have become much less open than in the pre-digital age to serendipitous, unscheduled "hanging out" with others.

Liming is a musician, and she writes about having accidentally walked with her instrument into a gathering of other musicians while visiting Asheville, NC, and of how they "jammed" for hours – a totally unplanned event. We all have memories of occasions like this – of wonderful times had with others when we least expected it. Such times are the "spice" of life – renewing our joy in living.

One of the benefits of a synagogue community is that we offer a gathering place for people to come together. Some of us find deep meaning in praying and singing together, or in learning Torah. But that is not all we offer: our adult ed class is a great place for conversations on fascinating topics; during the temperate months some of us enjoy walking together in beautiful areas of the Southcoast – while we walk, we share our lives; and recently, many of us greatly enjoyed food and fellowship at our TBE Chanukah party.

We all know that we are beset with a Jewish demographics challenge in the Fall River area. But *numbers* are not everything. What is important for the vitality of our community is that we stay *active* – that we put down our phones, clear our calendars, and *participate* in lively fellowship with one another.

There are no special Jewish holidays this month, but I hope you will join us for a Shabbat service, a Sunday afternoon movie, or some Jewish learning. We can discuss both the inspiring and the worrisome aspects of our world, or just enjoy a good laugh together. As I write this, I have just returned from our monthly Jewish Sunday afternoon movie, This Is Where I Leave You. This comedy of a family sitting shiva was the most laugh-out-loud movie I have seen in a very long time. There is something about humor that is *shared*...it is just *funnier* when shared with a group of people. The important thing, if we want our Temple Beth El community to stay vibrant, is that we do not shy away from the radical act of "hanging out" together. It can help keep us all individually "young at heart," and it holds the secret to keeping our synagogue-community alive, so that this congregation will still be here to serve others for many future generations. I hope to see many of you soon!

Thanks to foresight and a successful fundraising campaign in 1990, organized by Anne Prial, Gladys Sugarman, Joseph Shaw, Sanford Litchman and Morris Lepes, our cemetery will continue to be privately maintained for at least one hundred years.

We have received numerous phone calls, emails and notes of support, from Jews and non-Jews alike. And while everyone is saddened by the need to move, they also understand what we are facing.

We will continue to keep you informed as we move forward.

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## SUNDAY AFTERNOON AT THE JEWISH MOVIES!

Nominated for 15 Israeli Ophir awards, Image of Victory (2022), directed by Avi Nesher, was inspired by real events: the film provides a nuanced look at circumstances leading up to the June 1948 fighting at Kibbutz Nitzanim, viewed from both Egyptian and Israeli perspectives. Its consideration of how storytelling and visual images can be weaponized makes it a tale with great resonance for these times. It also introduces the film's narrator, Egyptian journalist Hassanin, who is tasked with documenting the Arab fight to displace the Jews.

When Hassanin documents a failed attack on the kibbutz, his footage is destroyed back in Cairo, but it does inspire the Egyptian generals to send in their professional army, especially after the Israelis declare independence. While pressure grows on Hassanin to film a victory, the inhabitants of Nitzanim must decide what to do as the kibbutz becomes increasingly isolated, with no reinforcements available for their defense. Running time: 130 minutes.
