A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

Nothing like the Real Thing

Just last month, on May 11th, the U.S. Dept of Health and Human Services declared the end of the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency. As you may have noticed, the plexiglass shields in the supermarket are mostly gone now, and fewer and fewer people are masking when they go out in public. It has been a long time – over three years! Our lives have been changed in multiple ways by the experience of the coronavirus pandemic, both for bad, and, in some cases, for good. The question before us now is: how do we get back to a healthy way of functioning, not just as individuals, but in our communal life?

I recently visited a friend, a writer and freelance editor, who moved some years ago from California, where she had lived almost her whole life, to upstate New York. My friend, K., moved to the Adirondack-area for a job which looked promising, but when that job turned sour, she stayed in the area and developed her own business, mentoring writers and doing line-editing on their manuscripts. Because K. interacted with interesting, artistic people from all over North America, and perhaps because she still felt her closest ties to friends back in California, she did not work hard at finding an actual physical community in her area. She worked with and talked with friends and clients on Zoom or on the phone; she held retreats for writers several times a year - so she did spend some actual time with these people in person, but they did not live in the area, and they were not a permanent fixture of the physical community where K. lived.

Then one day K. fell (she had fainted), and in the process, broke her arm. She was at home alone. When she woke up, with the broken arm, she knew she had to get to an emergency room, and she knew that she could not drive herself there. But the only person in the area who she felt close enough with to ask this kind of favor of was out of town. Eventually, K. did find a ride to the hospital, but it was an awkward situation (she had to ask someone with whom she did not have the most amicable of relationships), and the person who gave her the ride did not wait to see how she was, but simply dropped her off at the ER.

This unfortunate situation made K. realize that she had almost no close friends in her geographical area, and no real community there. And thinking about this story, I began to wonder: how many other people across America feel this way? It is great that we can Face-time, Googlechat, Zoom, talk on What's App, Skype, etc. with people all over the world. We can be a part of virtual communities with people who share many of the same interests, perspectives, or with people who are working together with us to better the world in some way. But that still is not the same as actually living within a 10-mile radius of one another. To see one another on a screen is not the same as being able to sit down together in the same room and talk; it is not the same as taking a walk together; it is not the same as being able to give one another a hug; not the same as sharing a meal.

I write these words just as we are getting ready at Temple Beth EI to come together for the largest "social" event we have shared since that Purim service and dinner in March of 2020 – the last event at Temple Beth EI before the COVID-19 shutdown. Yes, we have restarted in-person services (but always with a Zoom component); we began enjoying Jewish movies together last summer; and we have even begun to share kiddush-luncheons after Shabbat services once a month. Mark and I hosted a Chanukah meal at our home this past December, but it was sparsely attended. I suppose most people were still not ready to socialize.

Here's the thing. We are part of a real community – and it is possible that we don't realize how lucky we are. We shouldn't take it for granted. Many people across this nation, who no longer belong to churches or synagoguecommunities, who no longer join bridge clubs or bowling leagues, the PTA or the local Masonic lodge – have lost this sense of community. In a real community, you have someone you can call when you need help. They don't have to be your best friend, but they will help, because that's what community members do.

Real community requires real presence. I know that some of our members have given up driving, and some perhaps have health issues that keep them close to home. But if it is at all possible, I urge you to join us for our June 11th gala event in person – also, if you would like to come to some of our Shabbat services in person, but need a ride, please contact the TBE office, and we will try to match you up with someone who can give you that ride.

To be with other human beings in real life – not on a screen – this is a muscle that we do not want to let atrophy! Yes, we come together to pray and to praise God. But we also come to check in on one another, to laugh and cry together, simply to be in one another's presence. I am excited about our upcoming "homecoming" event, and I hope that this will begin a trend of us functioning as an *in person* community again. Technology has been a godsend for us in many ways, especially as we went through an almost 3-year pandemic. But there's nothing like the real thing. We are so lucky to be a part of a community like Temple Beth El's, which has lasted for over 95 years. Let's keep it going for many, many more!

Looking forward to seeing you soon!


TBE Summer 2023 Nature Walks

July 16th, 2 PM: "The Attack" An Israeli Arab physician offers assistance at the scene of a gruesome suicide bombing in Tel Aviv and then learns that the bomber was his own wife. Stunned and furious, he sets out to confront the people who encouraged her deadly decision. Winner of five international film awards. (2012, 1 hr., 35 min.)

Aug. 13th, 2 PM: "A Walk on the Moon" A 1999 movie produced by Dustin Hoffman, directed by Tony Goldwyn. The story-line involves a Jewish family, focusing on the mother, who experience the summer of the 1969 Apollo Moon landing, as well as Woodstock, from the vantage point of a Jewish summer bungalow in the Catskills. Left without her husband for most of the summer, Pearl Kantrowitz is drawn into the web of a mysterious traveling salesman passing through the Catskills, and must decide whether to stay with her husband and family, or leave the familiar life she has always lived behind for a "walk on the moon."
