A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown "The Song Goes On"

Having not read the book, The Zookeeper's Wife upon which the film (recently shown at TBE) was based, I was quite bowled-over by its poignant, lyrical (and true) story. Before any of the film's sad events began to unfold, I found my eyes watering up. I laughed to see a baby camel trot after the main character, Antonina, as she pedals her bike through the zoo grounds; was moved watching her cuddle young lion cubs; anxious as she struggles to clear the airway of a just-delivered baby elephant while its mother watches, clearly in distress. Although I am not one who loves animals more than people, nevertheless in this context - knowing that the Nazi invasion and the "Final Solution" are about to occur in Poland (the story's setting) - the innocence and vulnerability of these zoo animals pulled at my heartstrings in a peculiar way. How can this world be so extraordinary and so terrible at the same time? How has it come to be that these animals with their hooves, teeth, and claws, their tusks and sheer brute strength, are captives, and dependent on such puny creatures as human beings for their survival?

As a viewer, you feel distress when German aircraft begin bombing Warsaw, killing and maiming many animals, wrecking their cages and stalls, loosing tigers and lions into the city's streets. The incongruity of a tiger walking down a European city street says it all: everything is upside down, crazy, nothing is right. And eventually, as the zoo is emptied, it gains new residents: some 300 of Warsaw's Jews whom the zookeeper and his wife have come to realize are in even more danger than their four-legged charges.

By the time you receive this April bulletin, it will be Passover, and Yom HaShoah will be right around the corner (about this, see News and Notes). The date for Yom Ha-Shoah, the 27th of Nissan, was fixed by the Knesset (Israel's Parliament) in 1959, after much discussion (its choice was controversial, since the month of Nissan is supposed to be one of joy). The Israeli government picked this date in order that the commemoration be close to the date of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising (the full name of Yom HaShoah being Yom HaZikaron LaShoah V'haGevurah - "Day of Rembrance of the Holocaust and of Heroism"). The uprising actually began on Erev Pesach, April 19th, 1943, when the Nazis began to liquidate the Warsaw Ghetto. It was the day before Hitler's birthday, and it is said that the German troops involved were determined to make this liquidation a kind of "offering" to Hitler for his birthday. Since Erev Pesach is a minor fast day in our calendar (the Fast of the First-Born), the Knesset considered fixing this date in the Hebrew calendar for remembering the Shoah, but its closeness to the Seder made that day impractical. Since Yom HaAtzma'ut had already been established as falling on the 5th of Iyar (the date in the Hebrew calendar corresponding to May 14th, 1948 when Israel declared its independence), there seems to have been a feeling that a date in between these two days (the date

of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising and that of Israel's declaration of independence) might somehow link the heroism of the ghetto's resistance fighters and the return of the Jewish people to national sovereignty.

From March to May (Adar to Iyar) we have a tumultuous chain of days, which begins with Purim (a holiday remembering when we came near to being annihilated during our Persian exile). One month later we celebrate our "festival of freedom," Passover; approximately 2 weeks later we are thrown back into remembering the tragedy of the Holocaust (along with commemorating its heroes); and one week after that, in Israel, the fresher pangs of loss are keenly felt on Yom HaZikaron (Memorial Day), which as the sun sets on it, turns into the joy and celebration of Yom HaAtzma'ut (Independence Day). This tug-of-war on our emotions in the Jewish calendar is partly the result of the intertwining of the traditional religious Jewish calendar with the newer secular days that have been fixed since the Holocaust and the establishment of the modern Jewish state. But it is also the result of the vicissitudes of history, and in some measure, the paradox of existence: how can such beauty and goodness coexist with such cruelty and depravity in God's creation?

One of the most memorable scenes in *The Zookeeper's Wife* is that of the night of the burning of the Warsaw Ghetto – which coincided with Erev Pesach. One young girl who was among those hiding in Antonina's cellar asked if they might have a *seder* that night. And so we see Jews gathered around Antonina's and Jan's table, and hear this same girl chanting "*Mah nishtanah ha layla ha-zeh...*" – "How is this night different from all other nights?" – and then the camera cuts to the ghetto in flames, Jews of all ages, from the very old to babies, being shot in the streets, or forced to board cattle cars. The contrast between this teenage girl's beautiful voice, so clear and pure, singing a song associated with freedom and deliverance, with the scenes of evil being perpetrated not far away in the same city is heartrending.

While some may view the decimation of the Jewish people in the Holocaust as reason to reject a life of faith and commitment to Jewish practice (Why worship a God who cannot save us, or who *chooses not to intervene* against such evil?), that is not the only conclusion that can be drawn from the events of the last century. Some survivors of the Shoah, or, more likely these days, some who have studied and thought deeply *about* the Shoah, find that living and practicing a vibrant Jewish life, full of rituals, blessings, study and doing acts of justice (*tzedakah*) fills their lives with beauty, meaning and purpose. It is in fact this which "saves" us. Hitler wanted not only to strip individual Jews of life and dignity, but also to remove Jewish tradition from the face of the earth. Against the backdrop of Hitler's evil, what do we hear? A young girl singing "*Mah Nishtanah*."

Hitler is gone, but the song goes on.

Wishing you blessings during these remaining days of Pesach, and into the spring!
