A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

Where Do We Go from Here?

As I write these words we are just one week past Election Day and most of us, in Massachusetts at least, are still reeling from the surprise victory of President-elect Trump. However you voted, this turn of events has been a shocker to most of the country – including, apparently, the President-elect himself!

While all of America watches as Trump assembles his cabinet and makes slightly-revised pronouncements about his goals, we in the Jewish world cannot help but watch with mixed feelings. What to make of this businessman whose father engaged him to carry out racially-based housing discrimination in the 1960's? Can we as Jews forget that there was a time when we were the ones who were not allowed to settle in certain towns or neighborhoods? And yet Trump's daughter, son-in-law and three of his grandchildren are Jewish - and not just "cultural Jews," but Modern Orthodox! Some Jews who lean towards the right on matters pertaining to Israel feel glad that Trump seems to see eye-to-eye with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu on a number of concerns, including holding a dim view of the Iran nuclear agreement. So it seems that President-elect Trump is invested in a more hawkish view of Israel's security-needs. Whether you agree that this will better protect Israel or not (Netanyahu and his own generals and security chiefs, it should be noted, do not agree amongst themselves) - you have to scratch your head in wonder at how a man who is staking out a strong stance about the security of the Jewish State can propose to fill the position of "chief strategist" on his staff with Steve Bannon, executive chairman of BreitbartNews, which Bannon deliberately crafted into a platform for the "alt-right."

In case you have not yet heard this term, here is a definition from an article posted on November 14 by Ben Sales, of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, on the JTA website:

The alt-right, short for alternative right, "encompasses a range of people on the extreme right who reject mainstream conservatism in favor of forms of conservatism that embrace implicit or explicit racism or white supremacy," according to the ADL (Anti-Defamation League). "People who identify with the alt-right regard mainstream or traditional conservatives as weak and impotent, largely because they do not sufficiently support racism and anti-Semitism."

"Oy vey!" you may be exclaiming, "This just doesn't make any sense." And I would agree with you. Both President Barak Obama and Secretary Hillary Clinton have spoken to the American people, graciously congratulating Donald Trump on his election, and asking us to receive him with an open mind and good wishes, giving him a chance to lead. Trump himself, in his acceptance speech, expressed the desire to

"bind the wounds" of our division as a people, and to be "President for all Americans," even going so far as to say:

...I'm reaching out to you for your guidance and your help so we can work together and unify our great country...

It will be a movement comprised of people from all races, religions, backgrounds and beliefs who want and expect our government to serve the people...

Working together we will begin the urgent task of rebuilding our nation and renewing the American dream.

As an American who cares deeply about both our nation and our planet, I sincerely wish the best for President-elect Trump: I hope and pray that he will be guided with wisdom, compassion, and a sense of urgency to do justice both to our people and to our environment, and that he sees that whatever we do here has ripple effects throughout the world, and that it will impact many future generations.

How do we respond to this moment as Jews? Of course we have diverse political views. Some of the differences amongst us are the result of diverging opinions on the best way to reach shared goals. We all want peace, security, prosperity, justice for all, and a healthy environment – but we do not necessarily agree on the practical steps for achieving these goals.

As Jews, I hope that we might keep a few teachings of our tradition in mind as we go forward in this uncertain time: First, that God made all human beings in the divine image – we are all equal and precious in God's eyes. Second, that God gave us the responsibility to be "guardians" of Creation (see Genesis 2:15). Third, that it is not enough to be vigilant for the sake of our own people, but, like Abraham who argued with the Almighty on behalf of all the residents of Sodom, we must stand up for justice and for safety on behalf of all residents of our nation, whether Christian, Muslim, atheist, or of any other stripe. As we are exhorted by Scripture, Do not stand idly by the blood of your neighbor. (Leviticus 19:16), we must not be passive or indifferent to suffering or injustice in our midst.

President-elect Trump has a huge job ahead of him, and so do we all. As we look forward to Chanukah, to our celebration of freedom and hope, of light triumphing over darkness, I pray that we all might be invested with wisdom, compassion, and courage to do right by one another, and by this precious world that God created and entrusted to our care.

Like a fat slab of pastrami, "Deli Man" is the cinematic equivalent of comfort food: warm, generous and made with love.

Loosely structured around a profile of Houston restaurateur David "Ziggy" Gruber — a thirdgeneration "deli man" and the film's genial tour guide — the documentary is also a history of the American institution of the Jewish delicatessen. Using archival photos, old menus and the like, filmmaker Erik Greenberg Anjou traces the rise of the deli from its mid-19th-century origins as a family business of German immigrants to its peak in the 1930s, when there were a couple thousand delis in New York City alone. Today, the film tells us, there are not even 200 Jewish delis left in the entire United States. Some of them, like San Francisco's Wise Sons, carry the torch while incorporating such "Jewish fusion" dishes as deep-fried kugel with maple syrup.

It also features interviews with other deli operators from around the country and such loyal celebrity customers as Jerry Stiller, Larry King and Fyvush Finkel.

If your mouth doesn't water while reading this, cross the film off your list. But if it does, head to the movie. Just make sure it's not on an empty stomach. Between all the towering corned beef and food talk, "Deli Man" will leave you hankering for the nearest place to get some "haimishe maykholim" — Yiddish for "homestyle cooking."
