Barukh atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melekh ha'olam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav, v'tzivanu l'hadlik ner shel Hanukkah.

Blessed are you Adonai our God, Ruler of the universe, who has made us holy through God's commandments, and commanded us to light the Hanukkah candles.

Blessing for Miracles

(recite immediately following the first blessing, prior to lighting)

Barukh atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melekh ha'olam, She'ahsa neesim la'avotaynu bayamim haheim baz'man hazeh.

Blessed are you Adonai our God, Ruler of the universe, who performed wonders for our ancestors in history at this very time of year.

Blessing for Special Occasions

(recite following the Blessing for Miracles only on the first night of Hanukkah)

Barukh atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melekh ha'olam, shehekheyanu v'kiy'manu v'higiyanu laz'man hazeh.

Blessed are you Adonai our God, Ruler of the universe, who gave us life, sustains us, and enabled us to reach this season.

A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

What is Now to Be?

As I write this column, halfway through November, I feel winter closing in - with the days getting dark so much earlier, and most of the trees' leaves on the ground, or with only the brown ones left clinging to the branches. The election is over, though this transition period until the president-elect is sworn in is fraught with tension. We hear or read in the news that the coronavirus is spiking again in Massachusetts, especially in Fall River (according to this morning's Fall River Herald News), and Dr. Fauci warns us that the winter months are going to be especially difficult, until the new vaccine begins to be administered widely. We are all worried about Thanksgiving - about people who don't take the danger of the virus seriously, about kids coming home from college and possibly bringing the virus along with them, however unwittingly.

And here at Temple Beth El we are all feeling sorrow over the loss of the man who was our dedicated custodian, George Haire. We had learned of George's diagnosis of cancer before the High Holy Days, but none of us expected George to be taken from us so soon. He was at work only days before he died! I confess that I did not know George well, but our son Lev spent many hours with him over the course of many Shabbat mornings. Mark and I would come in at ten to start the service, and Lev knew that he was expected to come in to the service by 10:30. Until then Lev would sit in the vestry and sometimes read, but usually George would fix Lev a bagel with cream cheese and sit with him for a while, and they would talk about what Lev was reading or discuss other topics that they both had interest in. Lev told us after George died that George had truly been one of his best friends, and that he will feel his loss deeply.

Mark and I have just recently restarted our adult ed class (on Zoom, of course), and the book we are currently reading together, *The Harlot by the Side of the Road: Forbidden Tales of the Bible* (by Jonathan Kirsch) is a fascinating and provocative read! Of course this long period of not being able to come together in person for services, meetings, classes, and communal celebrations has been trying on everyone, but there are some perks to our digital gatherings. One of our beloved Shabbat morning regulars, Florence Schlam, who lives now at an assisted living facility in New Jersey, is able to join us on Shabbat mornings again, and Susan Bender, who grew up in Fall River and is still a temple member, but now lives in Boston, has become a regular at every service.

gather at all this month for what has always been such a warm and cheerful community celebration of Chanukah...that really drives it home, how tough this time has been. Of course the pandemic restrictions began right around Passover, but at that time we could not have imagined that we would still be in this bind come Chanukah! As I type, I have a melancholy tune running through my head, one that I sang with the klezmer band, "Ezekiel's Wheels," two years ago. The song is a Yiddish one, "O Ir Kleyne Likhtelekh," which was composed around the time of the Holocaust. The speaker compares their current era to the time of the Maccabees, when there were great heroes and miracles:

O little lights of mystery You recall our history And all that went before The battles and the bravery And our release from slavery Miracles galore!

In the final verse, the speaker/singer confesses that things seem much darker in the present-time. Of course, unlike someone singing this song in the run-up to the *Shoah*, we *are* able to see a light off in the distance (a vaccine!), and yet the poignancy and the uncertainty about our future is something that we can nonetheless relate to:

O you little lights,
Telling of our history,
Waking up my pain...
Deep in the heart something is awoken And through tears one asks oneself:
What is now to be?

Though none of us can say for sure what the future will bring, certainly the Jewish people have been through darker times than this one. Our celebration of Chanukah this year, though it be low-key, and in the solitude of our individual homes, nevertheless reminds us never to give up, to keep lighting our little lights against the darkness. We have been here for many thousands of years, and we are still here now. Don't forget to spread your light by giving *tzedakah* during Chanukah – there are so many now in great need! And let us dream of a day not too far-off in the future when we will gather once again for a "welcome back" celebration for all of us at Temple Beth El – what a party we will have then!

This little light of mine – I'm gonna let it shine – let it shine, let it shine, let it shine!

May you all be blessed by the light of the Everpresent One this Chanukah, and may your spirit stay strong – we will get through this and see brighter times soon!

President's Message

As we get closer to putting 2020 behind us, we are hopefully closer to a vaccine and treatments for COVID-19. While I don't see much changing until at least the spring, it is a relief to finally have some good news on the horizon. Until then, however, we have to be more vigilant than ever, as the numbers are ominous right now, particularly right here in the greater Fall River area. For those of you who haven't yet heard, we lost our wonderful custodian, George Haire, in early November. He was diagnosed with esophageal cancer just this summer. As was his wish, he continued to come to work until the very end. I spoke to him two days before he passed and was shocked when I heard the news. He had just turned 66 years old. He was very handy, would do anything that was asked of him, and was totally reliable. Despite everything, he was here for all of our High Holidays, and on Yom Kippur he opened in the morning, left for a chemo treatment, and came back for the evening services. He loved working here, and he took his responsibilities seriously, all while trying to make us laugh with his incredibly dry wit. Rest in peace George, we will miss you.

I have met on several occasions with the FBI agent in charge of Hate Crimes for the Southeastern, MA area, along with a detective from the Fall River Hate Crimes unit. With all that is going on in the world they want to be sure they are as aware as they can be of any potential dangers. It has been my honor to work with them on behalf of the Jewish community, and it is a relief to know we have direct contacts to people who can help, in case help is ever needed. I sincerely hope that it never is.

On behalf of the congregation, I would like to extend our best wishes to Dr. Herb and Paula Rubin, who have decided to live year-round at their California home to be nearer to family. Herb and Paula have been active members of our congregation for many years, with Herb serving as Temple president. Good luck, stay safe and keep in touch!

Please join us via Zoom for the Chanukah candle-lighting on the first and last nights of Chanukah. While we will miss the fun of our annual party, we can still get together virtually to celebrate the holiday. Keep an eye out for a special Zoom link!


TBE News & Notes

George Haire, taking care of one of his many duties at Temple Beth El, lost his short battle with cancer in early November.

The following is an excerpt from Cantor Shoshana's Corona Chronicles, Week 35:

Here in our own community at Temple Beth El, we have lost our faithful custodian, Mr. George Haire, who had also served Fall River's last remaining Orthodox congregation, Adas Israel, until they finally closed just last year. George was a man of the driest humor of anyone I ever met; he was always joking, but you often did not know it! But he served the temple and its community with great loyalty and humility. He was not one to look for honors; his life was quite different from that of a soldier; nonetheless, he was dedicated to serving others. Now George did not die of the coronavirus; he had cancer, only diagnosed in the past few months. His passing so quickly was not expected. In fact he was still at work in the temple just a few days before he died. Like a soldier, George died "with his boots on." He will be missed by us all, but perhaps most of all by our son Lev, who considered George one of his best friends.

The following is from an email from Marie to the congregation. It is reprinted here for those not on our email list.

It is with a heavy heart that I must let you all know that our beloved custodian, George Haire, has passed away as a result of esophageal cancer. He was 66 years old.

George came to us when Adas Israel closed in 2013, and then took over after Tom Gregory retired. George came highly recommended by Jackie Gedacht, who said he was the best maintenance man she ever worked with. Although our boiler was his baby and he could fix just about anything, he wasn't just a maintenance man. He also understood the workings of a kosher kitchen, and put together beautiful platters of tuna and egg salad, tossed salad, and best of all, French toast. He was incredibly reliable, right up until the end, and would do anything asked of him without complaint...except work during a Patriots game. We all have to draw the line somewhere!

George had a dry wit, which he always delivered with a very straight face. Just a week ago he told me he was able to eat small bites of solid food, like steak and kosher pork. While I was wondering why he would require kosher pork when he is a catholic, he looked at me and rolled his eyes. He loved catching people out when they weren't paying attention!

He also enjoyed interacting with the kids in the preschool (and the ladies in the preschool office), and particularly loved the daughter of his best friends, Sue & Bill Franco. Sue was often one of our servers at events, as was his sister, Elaine. And Bill helped him out with several projects here. It seems people had trouble saying no to George!

The funeral is going to be private, but if you would like to send a card to his family please send it to his sister, Elaine Quental, 397 Shove St, Fall River, MA 02724.


