A message from our Spiritual Leader
Rabbi Mark Elber

The liberal Jewish world has recently received what for some is a wake-up call regarding affiliation and identification of Jews in the United States. It came in the form of the recent Pew survey on American Judaism. When people speak of liberal Jews or liberal Judaism they mean all those who don't identify as Orthodox, which means, by far, the vast majority of Jews in this country and in the world. Though Orthodoxy has had somewhat of a revival in the last 20 years or so and despite the fact that Orthodox Jews, especially the ultra-Orthodox, reproduce at a far higher rate than liberal Jews, they remain a small minority of the Jewish demographic in America. However, the offspring of Orthodox Jews retain a much higher percentage of Jewish affiliation and identification, especially religious affiliation, than liberal Jews.

A very large percentage of liberal Jews, and particularly their offspring, no longer identify with Judaism, though they still may identify ethnically and culturally as Jews. Religious affiliation and participation has dropped off precipitously, not only in the Jewish world, but in the country as a whole. However, within liberal Judaism, the biggest drop has been in the precincts of the Conservative movement. Conservative Judaism, which for many years was the largest denomination in the U.S., no longer is. Conservative Judaism, whose mission has been honoring and preserving Jewish Tradition while simultaneously helping it adapt to the increasingly rapid changes of the modern world, has lost many adherents to one end of the spectrum or the other. Some formerly Conservative Jews have sought a less questioning and less modern connection with the Tradition by becoming Orthodox or simply a less traditional religious practice by becoming Reform Jews. And increasing numbers, especially among Jews in their 20's and 30's, no longer feel drawn to any variety of Judaism.

The Conservative movement feels the urgency of the moment and the imperative for change, but hasn't come up with any noteworthy innovations yet. But change is inevitable and the movement-wide need for it is pressing. Change tends to be difficult and at times even tumultuous. No synagogue has a congregation in which all the members seek the same things from their affiliation, nor believe the same things about God, community, social action, etc. Ideally all of the various strata in the community can find an outlet and a home under the same roof. Because society is changing at an increasingly rapid rate, primarily due to the speed of

technological innovation, change will undoubtedly be a constant factor in our lives and in the life of our community.

Another striking finding in the Pew survey was the decreasing commitment to, and identification with, the State of Israel, particularly among younger Jews. This afternoon I had the great fortune of seeing the play "Golda's Balcony" performed under the auspices of The Second Story Theater at the Historic Bristol Statehouse. The play will show through December 8th and I highly recommend it for many reasons. The one-woman show is wonderfully acted and brings to life a very important era in Jewish and Israeli history through the riveting performance of Sandra Laub as Golda Meir. (I only wish I had been here to see Linda Monchik perform the same role.) The ultimate dramatic moment occurs during the Yom Kippur war which occasions Golda's reflections on her own life and the life of the Jewish people. I happened to have been living in Israel during the Yom Kippur war and its evocation rang extremely true and faithful to me and brought up so many powerful emotions and memories.

The entire Zionist movement and the establishment of the State of Israel was a powerful and creative response to a previous, maybe unprecedented, crisis in Jewish life. The ingathering of the Jewish exiles to our ancient homeland could not have occurred on the scale necessary in a previous era because it required a technological advance that could move vast numbers of people over great distances in ways that never existed before. There were many people and many Jews who opposed the re-establishment of Jewish sovereignty in Israel, especially in its early days. Leadership involves risks and is not always popular. Many of the prophets we revere today were often reviled in their own lifetimes. Change can be very challenging, but not changing is more fraught with peril.

My Judaism cannot be the same as our son's. He is growing up in different times, in different circumstances, with different forces forging his identity. I can only hope that we can give the next generation the tools to make Judaism their own so that they can find, in their unique way, spiritual, emotional and social fulfillment and inspiration in its accumulated wisdom.

May this Chanukah (whose name means "dedication"), this holiday of lights, be a time of joy, health, and rejuvenated dedication for all of us.

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Israel on Her 65th Birthday – Taking Pride In Her Accomplishments

The State of Israel is the 100th smallest country in the world with less than 1/1000th of the world's population, yet her people have accomplished so very much even as she has struggled in war and been forced to spend more money per capita on her own protection than any other country on earth.

On Israel's 65th birthday I pause to marvel in all she is and represents to the Jewish people.

I raise my glass to her accomplishments in literature, medicine, agriculture, the arts, science, and technology.

I tip my hat to her courage and survival.

Consider the following:

- Israel is the only country in the Middle East that based its principles of government on both democratic liberal values and on the values of the Biblical prophets.
- Israel is the largest immigrant-absorbing nation on earth.
- Israel has the world's second highest per capita rate of published books.
- Israel is the only nation on earth that resurrected an ancient language, Hebrew, as its national language.
- Israeli poets and song writers are regarded as heroes.
- Israel is the only country in the world that entered the 21st century with a net gain in its number of trees.
- Israel has more museums per capita than any country.
- Israel developed the cell phone, Windows NT and XP operating systems, Pentium MMX Chip technology, the Pentium-4 microprocessor, the Centrino Processor, voice mail technology, and AOL Instant Messenger ICQ.
- Israel has the highest per capita rate of home computers in the world.
- Israel designed the airline industry's most impenetrable flight security system.
- Israel designed and implemented the Iron Dome Defense system.
- Israel has the highest ratio of university degrees in the world.
- Israel produces more scientific papers per capita than any other nation, and one of the highest per capita rates of patents filed.
- Israel has the third highest rate of entrepreneurship in the world.
- Israel is second in the world in the number of start-up companies behind only the U.S.
- Israel has the world's largest per capita number of biotech start-ups.
- Israel has the third largest number of NASDAQ listed companies, behind the U.S. and Canada, and is ranked second for



venture capital funds.

- Israel has the highest average living standard in the Middle East.
- 24% of Israel's workforce holds university degrees, ranking third in the industrialized world; 12% hold advanced degrees.
- Israel leads the world in the number of scientists and technicians in the workforce.
- Israel is a world leader in water renewal, recycling, desalination, and solar heating.
- Israel invented the drip irrigation system used around the world.
- An Israeli company is developing a toilet that needs no water and generates its own power to turn solid waste into sterile and odorless fertilizer in 30 seconds, thereby affecting 1.1 billion people who do not use a toilet.
 - An Israeli scientist has developed a way to preserve 50% of every grain and pulse harvest lost to pests and mold in the developing world.
 - Israel won international praise for the speed and expertise with which it responded to a 7.0-magnitude earthquake in Haiti that killed 300,000 by sending a team of 240 Israeli doctors, nurses, rescue and relief workers to set up an advanced field hospital to work in search-and-rescue missions.
 - An Israeli company developed a water purification system that delivers safe drinking water from contaminated water, seawater and even urine thereby addressing the tragedy of 1.6 million children under the age of five who die annually from untreated drinking water in developing nations.
- Israeli scientists developed the first fully computerized, no-radiation, diagnostic instrumentation for breast cancer.
- Hadassah medical researchers found the gene that causes liver disease, thus paving the way for new treatments for alcoholism.
- Tel Aviv University Scientists say a nutritional supplement commonly sold in health food stores can delay the advance of degenerative brain disorders such as Parkinson's disease.
- Israel's Given Imaging developed the first ingestible video camera, so small it fits inside a pill that can view the small intestine from the inside to detect for cancer and digestive disorders.
- Israeli researchers developed a device that helps the heart pump blood that is synchronized with a camera that helps doctors diagnose the heart's mechanical operations through a system of sensors.
- An Israeli company developed a computerized system for ensuring proper administration of medications, thus removing human error from medical treatment.

In the spirit of Yom Ha'atzmaut I celebrate her, despite her imperfections and challenges, with enthusiasm and the words of the Psalmist in my heart: "This is the day God has made; we will rejoice and be glad in it!" (Psalm 118:24)
