A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

"Tumultuous Times and Judaism's Earth Day"

What tumultuous times we live in! I suppose people have been saying that since the time that the human species first picked up sticks and began using them as tools and/ or weapons, or began to harness the use of fire. Still, as I left for the Ohalah Jewish Renewal Annual Clergy Conference in Broomfield, CO on Thursday, Jan. 8th, I felt a sense of heightened awareness that our world is on the brink of changing in ominous ways. The offices of *Charlie Hebdo*, in Paris, had just been attacked by Muslim extremists, and by the time I reached my hotel, a Parisian kosher grocery store had become a target as well.

That was Thursday. On Sunday, Jan. 11th, almost four million people across France marched to protest terrorism and religious extremism, and to show solidarity in their support of freedom of expression and freedom of the press—including Israel's Prime Minister, Benjamin Netanyahu, and Mahmoud Abbas, President of the Palestinian Authority. Sitting in my hotel room, I streamed video footage of the event on my laptop. The images reminded me of the black and white photos of the marchers in Selma, where King and Heschel, nuns, priests, old and young, black and white were all marching together 50 years ago...and I cried with relief and in gratitude that so much of the world had turned out for this peaceful march, filling the streets of Paris.

On Monday, January 12th, I read in the paper of Nigerian towns attacked by Boko Haram, another Muslim extremist/terrorist group, leaving over 2,000 dead, and 10,000 Nigerians fleeing to neighboring Chad. (The article reminded the reader that the girls kidnapped by Boko Haram this past October have still not been freed or rescued, although three did escape.) And as I write these words on the evening of Martin Luther King Day, I read that this same group has now kidnapped dozens of people in Cameroon...

Meanwhile, a lesser-known piece of news emerges (which I heard on National Public Radio) that an unusual amount of seismic activity—multiple small earthquakes—are starting to be felt across Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, and Oklahoma, especially noticeable now in large cities such as Dallas—due, most scientists agree, to a process associated with fracking—the injection of the fracking process' wastewater into underground disposal wells. It is hard not to feel that, just as Parisians have responded to terrorist attacks by taking to the streets, so the Earth itself is responding to this violent intrusion into her inner core by trying to "shake us off." "Leave me alone!" the Earth seems to be crying. In my opinion we ignore these quakes at our own peril. How much clearer can the message be?

I sense somehow that all of these events (and more, which I do not have time to explore here) are linked, and they are all telling us: Wake up! Do something before it is too late!

Is it just a coincidence? The dependence of the United States on fossil fuels has certainly influenced us to ignore many egregious human rights abuses when dealing with oilrich countries. How is it that in a place like Nigeria, one of the largest oil-exporting countries of the world, over half of the population lives in abject poverty? I found the following on a Wikipedia article "Petroleum Industry in Nigeria":

"While Nigeria's oil revenue has totaled \$340 billion in exports since the 1970s and it is the fifth largest producer, 70% of its population lives on less than \$1 a day, and 43% have no access to clean water. Though Nigeria is a major oil exporter, it imports most of its gasoline, and when fuel subsidies were lifted in January 2012, fuel increased from roughly \$1.70 per gallon to \$3.50. Nigeria seems to be well set up – it produces a form of oil ideal for the United States, has huge reserves, and has increased its production to 2.8 million barrels of oil a day. But this, some say, is all a resource curse that is hurting Nigeria and disadvantaging her people."

So much for Nigeria and our desperate search for fossil fuels, both overseas and within our own borders—but how is this related to the terrorism of Isis or Al-Qaida?

Greed, racism, disregard for the environment, apathy with regard to the conditions of the poorest of the earth...I believe that all of these ills are linked, and have laid the foundations for desperate people turning towards, or being intimidated by, armed religious extremist groups all around the developing world. Sadly, all too often the West has propped up weak, corrupt governments—ignoring long-term consequences for short-term gains. These governments have not been able to stand up to these militant extremist groups, and at times have even abetted them.

So, *nu*—what do we do now? The Torah and the prophets exhort us: *justice, justice you shall pursue*—not just for every human being created in God's image, but justice *for all of God's creation*. Tu biShevat (Judaism's "Earth Day") is coming. Let us take these things to heart: we may not all agree on all issues, but we all want peace, plenty, freedom, justice, and a healthy ecosystem for all the earth, for all its peoples, and for all its creatures. Is this possible? Like the Rev. Martin Luther King, we have to hold on to this dream—and *work towards it*—for we are also exhorted "Choose life!" There is no alternative.

With prayers that our Planet and all her peoples and creatures may know health, justice and peace, and may we one day live together in harmonious song,

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
Cantor Shoshana's Month in Review:

Cantor Shoshana attended the 17th Annual Ohalah Jewish Renewal Clergy Conference in Broomfield Colorado from Jan 9th through Jan. 14th. The theme of the Conference this year was " Integral Tikkun Olam: Exploring New Visions." Featured at the conference were Ruth W. Messinger, President of American Jewish World Service (AJWS), the world's leading Jewish organization working to end poverty and realize human rights in the developing world; Rabbi Michael Lerner, editor of Tikkun magazine; Rabbi Uri Regev, President and CEO of a new educational and advocacy Israel-Diaspora partnership, "Freedom Of Religion for Israel" and of its Israeli counterpart, "Hiddush - For Freedom of Religion and Equality"; and Rabbi Arthur Waskow, founder and director of the Shalom Center and author or editor of about twenty books on US public policy and on religious thought and practice.

Cantor Shoshana received a gift copy of a



book in the mail upon returning from Colorado: Shma Koleinu: A Jewish People's Commentary on the Siddur edited by Rabbi Steven Schwarzman. Cantor Shoshana's essay on the liturgical poem, Ilu Finu is included in the book, as are a number of essays by Rabbi Samuel Barth, a mentor of both our cantor and rabbi, who was here for their installation in 2013. Elu v'Elu: Navigating difference while building community.

"Two Jews, at least 5 opinions," says the oft-repeated joke about the diversity of Jewish thought and belief on any given topic. While some may be moan such a lack of uniformity, others, including the Board of Rabbis of Greater Rhode Island, see this diversity as a source of strength and something to be shared and celebrated.

For this reason, the Board of Rabbis is inviting the community to its second annual "Drash & Dessert" evening of study on the theme of "Elu v'Elu: Navigating Difference While Building Community" on Saturday evening, February 7 at the Dwares Jewish Community Center. The program, which is set to begin at 7:00 pm with Havdalah, will feature four learning sessions taught by pairs or trios of local rabbis and conclude with a dessert buffet.

The Hebrew phrase "Elu v"Elu" translates as "These and these" and refers to a Talmudic passage in which the opposing viewpoints of two rabbis are both considered holy. Explained Rabbi Wechterman. The entire quote reads "These and these are the words of the living God."

The evening of study is designed to explore this theme. Sessions to be offered include "Is it better to be right or polite: a look at a playful but serious Talmudic text" with Rabbis Alan Flam, Wayne Franklin and James Rosenberg; "Heaven, Hell and the Afterlife" with Rabbis Andrew Klein and Alvan Kaunfer; "Being JewISH Today: the place of Jewish Particularism in a Universalist World" with Rabbis Michelle Dardashti, Marc Mandel and Sarah Mack; and "Meditations and Spiritual Practices with Rabbis Barry Dolinger, Mark Elber and Aaron Philmus.

There is no cost for this event and no prior Jewish knowledge is required. This program is a follow-up to last year's successful Drash & Dessert which also featured teachings by rabbis from different institutions and denominations throughout the region. This year's event is co-sponsored by the Alliance for Jewish Community and is supported by the William G. Braude fund, named for Rabbi William Braude, spiritual leader of Temple Beth El in Providence from 1932 – 1987 and a strong advocate of Jewish learning and education.
