A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

The Power of Song

In an August 13, 2013 article posted on TIME.com, the columnist Stacy Horn discusses the health benefits of singing:

When you sing, musical vibrations move through you, altering your physical and emotional landscape. Group singing, for those who have done it, is the most exhilarating and transformative of all. It takes something incredibly intimate, a sound that begins inside you, shares it with a roomful of people and it comes back as something even more thrilling: harmony. So it's not surprising that group singing is on the rise. According to Chorus America, 32.5 million adults sing in choirs, up by almost 10 million over the past six years...

As the popularity of group singing grows, science has been hard at work trying to explain why it has such a calming yet energizing effect on people. What researchers are beginning to discover is that singing is like an infusion of the perfect tranquilizer, the kind that both soothes your nerves and elevates your spirits.

The elation may come from endorphins, a hormone released by singing, which is associated with feelings of pleasure. Or it might be from oxytocin, another hormone released during singing, which has been found to alleviate anxiety and stress. Oxytocin also enhances feelings of trust and bonding, which may explain why still more studies have found that singing lessens feelings of depression and loneliness. A very recent study even attempts to make the case that "music evolved as a tool of social living," and that the pleasure that comes from singing together is our evolutionary reward for coming together cooperatively, instead of hiding alone, every cave-dweller for him or herself.

It's interesting to learn from this article that "group singing is on the rise," when so many have commented on how isolated we are in the digital age. We communicate constantly, but not face to face, and not in the old-fashioned way of simply talking and listening, or as Robert Putnam stressed in his best-selling 2000 work, *Bowling Alone: The Collapse and Revival of American Community*, not in a way that supports "the active civil engagement which a strong democracy requires from its citizens." People still bowl, Putnam, noted, but not in leagues – increasingly, they bowl alone.

If you think that I am about to tout both the social and health benefits of coming to services and events at Temple Beth El, you are right! On the Shabbat of Feb. 10th-11th, we mark in our Jewish calendar both *Tu biShevat*, the "New Year of the Trees," and *Shabbat Shirah* – the "Shabbat of Song." This is the Shabbat on which we hear in our Torah portion the chanting of

the "Song of the Sea," the song that Moses and Miriam led the newly-freed Israelites in on the shore of the Sea of Reeds after they had escaped from Egypt. The *haftarah* for that same Shabbat features the "Song of Deborah," one of Israel's early judges and military leaders after the wilderness period was over.

Ancient peoples sang for so many reasons: to soothe a crying child, to ward off boredom, to praise and connect with the Divine, to express their innermost longings, to protest unjust social conditions, and yes, to rouse the troops when marching off to war.

I believe that both individual singing and group singing are good for our souls (and bodies!). Many is the time that I have related to that song in *The King and I*:

Whenever I feel afraid, I hold my head erect, And whistle a happy tune So no one will suspect I'm afraid.

...

I whistle a happy tune, and every single time The happiness in the tune convinces me that I'm Not afraid!

Although this song is about whistling, the same can certainly be said for singing. Obviously, singing will not right all the wrongs of our world, nor cure all ailments. But it does go a long way toward providing us with a release from our worries (think of the blues), to calm anxiety, to connect us with others and with the Divine, and yes, I believe, to strengthen and inspire us to go out and make the world a better place.

Which brings us back to this "New Year of the Trees." In our era of anxiety over the planet's ecological health, this once lesser-known holiday is becoming more widely celebrated, as we long to connect Jewish values and teachings to the urgent needs of our planet. I urge you all to RSVP and to come to our Tu biShevat Seder on Friday, Feb. 10th, where we will celebrate both the preciousness of God's creation (especially the trees), and also enjoy the gift that God gave us in the power of song. As one of our most nature-loving teachers, Rabbi Nachman of Bratzlav taught, song and nature have an intimate connection. "Reb Nachman" urged us to "get into the habit of singing a tune. It will give you new life and fill you with joy." He also urged us to go out alone into "the forest or the field...There you will be able to listen attentively to the noise of the wind first, to birds singing, to see wonderful nature and to notice yourself in it...and to come back to harmonic connection with the world and its Creator."

Hoping to see...and sing with...you soon!

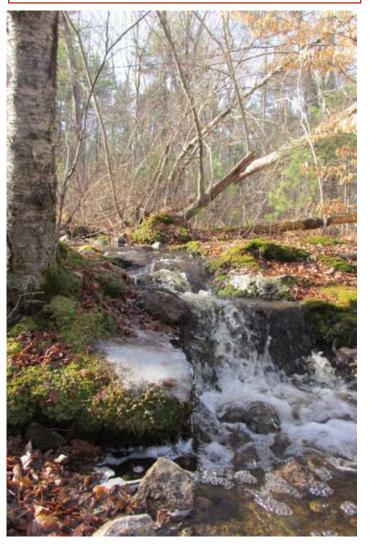

Ilan Duran Cohen's film concerns the amazing story of the Jewish-born Archbishop of Paris, **Jean-Marie Lustiger**.

No, its title is not an oxymoron. Rather, "The Jewish Cardinal" refers to Jean-Marie Lustiger, a Jew who converted to Catholicism at a young age and, after joining the priesthood, quickly rose up the ranks to become Archbishop of Paris and a chief advisor to Pope Jean Paul II. **Ilan Duran Cohen**'s revelatory biopic recounts this fascinating tale in thoughtful and compelling fashion, aided by the superb lead performance by **Laurent Lucas.**

Born the son of Polish-Jewish immigrants, Lustiger and his sister were sent to live with a Catholic woman in Orleans during the German occupation of France in 1940. Against his parents' wishes, he decided to convert when he was just 13 and was baptized. By the time the war ended, his mother had been murdered in Auschwitz, while his father survived.

The story's chief dramatic element revolves around a dispute concerning the controversial installation of a convent by Carmelite nuns on the Auschwitz grounds, prompting Lustiger, who obviously had deep emotional ties to the site, to question his religious allegiances.

As portrayed by Lucas, Lustiger emerges as a vitally human figure, prone to bouts of anger, self-justification and self-doubt that prevent the film from lapsing into turgid religious hagiography. He's well matched by Recoing, who entertainingly conveys the pope's charismatic and playful personality.

Although it will obviously appeal to religious audiences -- it has already played in nearly a dozen Jewish film festivals -- The Jewish Cardinal features a rare nuance that should interest the non-faithful as well.
