A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

We Are all Dependent upon One Another

A conversation about God from Alice Walker's ground-breaking 1982 novel, *The Color Purple:*

"Listen, God love everything you love - and a mess of stuff you don't. But more than anything else, God love admiration.

You saying God vain? I ast.

Naw, she say. Not vain, just wanting to share a good thing... People think pleasing God is all God care about. But any fool living in the world can see it always trying to please us back. Yeah? I say.

Yeah, she say. It always making little surprises and springing them on us when us least expect.

You mean it want to be loved, just like the Bible say? Yes, Celie, she say. Everything want to be loved. Us sing and dance, make faces and give flower bouquets, trying to be loved. You ever notice that trees do everything to git attention we do, except walk?"

This month we celebrate the Jewish holiday of Tu Bi-Shevat (the 15th of Shevat), also known as the Jewish "New Year of the Trees." Although the need for a date marking the new year for trees is mentioned in the Mishna (2nd-3rd century CE) - in order that farmers could know when fruit should be tithed in the Temple - it was not until the 16th century CE that the Jewish mystics of Tzfat began to celebrate this "new year" by holding an unusual type of seder on the 15th of the Hebrew month of Shevat. Why the 15th? Shouldn't a "new year" be on the first of the month? In the Mishna the opinion of Hillel (that it should be on the 15th) held sway over that of Shammai (who held with the 1st). It makes sense, since on this date the sap is said to begin to rise in the trees, which is the beginning of their bringing forth the fruits of the new year. When the moon is full, it is nearest the earth and its gravitational pull on the sap in the trees would be at its strongest - as with the waters of the ocean. (I did a search on this and discovered a conversation between maple syrup-producers who all concurred that the late-winter-early spring full moon was the best time for tapping their trees!)

The mystics of Tzfat chose to enhance this minor holiday because of their way of "mapping" the *s'firot* – the aspects of God – in a way that formed a diagram of a tree, which they referred to as the Tree of Life. But later Hasidic mystics, such as the Ba'al Shem Tov and Rabbi Nachman of Bratzlav also gave great importance to spending time alone in nature in order to be able to speak freely to God, and perhaps to also be able to "hear" God more clearly. Thus the 18th century Rabbi Nachman composed this famous *kavannah* ("intention") for himself:

"May it be my custom to go outdoors each day among

the trees (and) enter into prayer...may all the foliage of the field — all grasses, trees, and plants ...send the powers of their life into the words of my prayer so that my prayer and speech are made whole through the life and spirit of all growing things..."

In our Monday morning adult Jewish education class, we have been reading Rabbi David Wolpe's excellent book, *Why Faith Matters* (2008). We were all moved by the following story told therein:

"...of a Hasidic rabbi whose child used to wander off to spend time alone in a forest. Concerned and curious, one day the rabbi pulled his boy aside to ask him what he was doing. 'I go to the forest to find God,' said the boy. 'That's wonderful,' replied his father. 'But you need not go to the forest to find God. Don't you know that God is the same everywhere?' "God is,' the boy answered. 'but I'm not.'"

Planet Earth, seen as a whole organism, is so marvelously made, with innumerable interlocking, interdependent elements and beings, like the cells in a body, all living in symbiosis with one another. We breathe out, the trees breathe in; what they exhale, we inhale. The predator is important to the health of both the herd (keeping down its numbers so that they don't overgraze the land and thus more of them can survive the winter) and to trees (if too many deer or elk are competing for forage they will strip the trees of bark and thus endanger the life of the forest). It is now known that the great whales act as important carbon-sequesters through their long lives; and when they die, their great carcasses sink to the ocean floor, providing a feast to some 400-odd species that are sustained by the nutrients and shelter they provide, thus supporting marine biological communities for years, even decades (according to Jessica Perelman writing for National Geographic Newsroom). All is in a delicate, fantastic balance that we human beings still do not fully understand - and disrupt at our peril.

So Tu BiShevat is not just about trees, or fruits, the moon, or even about our relationship as Jews to God. It is a celebration of how all Creation is interwoven, a reminder that it is as important for us to be aligned with the other parts of Creation as it is with our Creator. So the next time a tree (or a flower, or even a whale!) waves at you (trying to "git your attention"), make sure to wave back, and then pause for a moment to think about what you can do to make their lives better. We are all dependent upon one another.

I also have some good news. With a great deal of help from Rick Schwartz, and with funds from the generous bequest of Barbara Kates, our cemetery is now equipped with security cameras. As we know all too well from the vandalism at the Hebrew cemetery last year, anti-Semitism exists all around us, and it behooves us to be vigilant. I sincerely hope that we never need to use the cameras, but I am also very glad that we have them.

As I said, it's a short month, and that's all the news I have for now – hope to see you at one or more of our events soon!



SUNDAY AT THE JEWISH MOVIES

James Cameron's "Avatar"

Okay, so *Avatar* is not exactly a Jewish movie, but the "good guys" in this film are called "*Na'vi,"* and the Hebrew word for a prophet is *navi* (*n'vi'im* in the plural), *and* the film also includes a "Tree of Souls," which might as well be called the "Tree of Life." That's close enough!

Here is the synopsis: "On the lush alien world of Pandora live the Na'vi, beings who appear primitive but are highly evolved. Because the planet's environment is poisonous, human/Na'vi hybrids, called Avatars, must link to human minds to allow for free movement on Pandora. Jake Sully, a paralyzed former Marine, becomes mobile again through one such Avatar and falls in love with a Na'vi woman. As a bond with her grows, he is drawn into a battle for the survival of her world."

Avatar is a 2009 American epic science fiction film directed, written, produced, and co-edited by James Cameron and stars Sam Worthington, Zoe Saldana, Stephen Lang, Michelle Rodriguez, and Sigourney Weaver.

Avatar was nominated for nine Academy Awards, including Best Picture and Best Director, and won three, for Best Art Direction, Best Cinematography and Best Visual Effects. (Please note that this is a 2 hour and 40-minute long film!)


