UPDATE ON THE SALE, MOVE & CEMETERY SEPARATION

High Street Sale – Estimated Closing Date Feb. 26th

The original closing date as proposed with the deposit was February 16, 2026. As noted in a separate email to all members, the Buyers Title agency has requested a current survey. The buyer has selected the company and is engaging with them to complete the task. As of February 2, 2026, the completion date has not been set. Once the survey is completed and certified plans are provided to the Title company, then the new closing date will be set.

Also, because of the nature of our operation, the Massachusetts Attorney General's office had to approve the sale. We have received their final approval.

In the meantime, the Buyer has already started to make repairs at their expense. They patched a few water pipes which were leaking. They have also been measuring various rooms to install a major fire suppression sprinkler system. This is per the latest code.

We have provided the Buyer with a checklist of all known closing topics, title, etc. to ensure there are no surprises. Our attorney has already completed a Title search and confirmed clean title for the property. (There was never a doubt of ownership. It is more about the ability to look through all the historical records and trace back building ownership to 1928, etc.)

The Fall River Public Library came with a large moving crew and took several items that can be reused for the public library: The large bookcase in Cantor Shoshana's office, the display cases in the vestry, and the full length bookshelves in the Board room. While it is a bit sad to see these items going, they are certainly going to a good home and hopefully used for another century.

Unitarian Building

We continue to have very nice services and kiddushes at our home in the UC building. (309 North Main Street, Fall River. Three blocks from the TBE building.)

In January we focused on electrical improvements. Most of it was behind the scenes but some of it was adornment. For adornment we now have the original eternal light from

the TBE Main Sanctuary shining continuously over our Ark at UC. We also have lights in the Ark at UC which illuminate the inside where the torahs are kept. The Ark lights are on a timer and come ON before Shabbat and turn OFF after Shabbat. (The Eternal Light stays on forever.)

Rick has organized a moving team to bring our Tree of Life from the High Street Sanctuary lobby to UC. Right now it is leaning against the wall, but we plan to mount it properly in February. We would love for you to stop by and see it in our new home. We are happy we were able to keep it!

TBE Cemetery – Legal Separation Next Steps

As noted in previous articles, the TBE Cemetery was legally separated from the Synagogue in September 2025. It is now a separate Massachusetts corporation from TBE, although TBE is still managing it.

The next step was to create a set of Cemetery By-Laws that stand alone from the original Congregation Beth El By-Laws. We now have the final version complete and by the time you read this article, they will have been submitted to the Massachusetts State Attorney General's office as required for new non-profit corporations.

The final step in the separation is filing with the Internal Revenue Service (Federal IRS) to request 501(c)(13) status for the cemetery. This was not required before because the cemetery was part of the original Congregation Beth El. But now as a separate legal entity an IRS filing is required. We forecast submitting the request to the IRS in March 2026 (via IRS form 1024). The federal government response is expected to take 3-6 months. I will update you in the summer when we receive this approval.

The last action for the Cemetery Board this quarter is to create a formal Rules and Regulations of Cemetery Operations document. This type of document already exists, as it governed how we operated the cemetery while under Congregation Temple Beth El. But now that the Cemetery is legally separated, the Cemetery Board needs to refresh the document and update some oversights that have been long standing. We hope to complete this effort in March.

A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

The Danger of Silence and the Courage to Speak Out

In the plot of Megillat Esther, a critical moment comes about half-way through the story. Mordechai refuses to bow down to the king's evil advisor, Haman. Thereupon, Haman determines to avenge his bruised ego on all those he sees as Mordechai's people. He speaks to the King of Persia, advising him to issue an edict for the destruction of all Jewish people in his kingdom. King Achashveirosh, seemingly oblivious to many facts about his kingdom (including the fact that his wife is a Jew), gives no thought to whether the decree for the destruction of Persian Jewry is right or humane or politically advisable, saying to Haman, *"The money and the people are yours to do with as you see fit"* (Esther 3: 11), and the edict is forthwith issued in the king's name.

Soon after this turn of events, Mordechai dons sackcloth and ashes, rends his clothes in mourning, and stations himself outside the palace gate. When Queen Esther learns of his presence there in such a state, she becomes agitated and has fresh clothing sent out to him – presumably that he not give offense to her husband the king. Mordechai refuses to take off his sackcloth, and sends word back to Esther about the decree against the Jews, charging her to *"go to the king, and to appeal to him, and to plead with him for her people"* (4:8).

When Esther receives this message from Mordechai, she sends back word that what he has charged her with is very dangerous, for no one, not even the king's wife, may enter the king's presence without being summoned; to transgress this law is to risk being put to death. Upon receiving this reply, Mordechai has this message delivered to Esther:

"Do not imagine that you, of all the Jews, will escape with your life by being in the king's palace. On the contrary, if you keep silent in this crisis, relief and deliverance will come from another quarter, while you and your father's house will perish. And who knows? Perhaps you have attained to royal position for just such a crisis." (4:13-15)

Hearing this message, Esther sends back word to Mordechai to ask him to charge all the Jews of Shushan to fast on her behalf for 3 nights and 3 days – a fast which she and her handmaidens will also observe – and then she will approach the king, *"although it is contrary to the law; and if I perish, I perish!"* (4:16).

Of course we all know how the story turns out. I was thinking of Esther on this recent Martin Luther King Day as I was sitting in the local Bethel AME Church, where Rabbi Mark and I had been invited to participate in the celebration of one of America's most courageous and transformative figures. During this very special service, where quite a cross-section of Fall River's population was gathered, we heard many famous quotes from Dr. King. The one that stuck in my head was:

"Our lives begin to end the day we become silent about things that matter."

Another related quote was the following:

"In the end, we will remember not the words of our enemies, but the silence of our friends."

This has been such a difficult era for anyone in a non-partisan leadership position! To risk speaking out about "things that matter" – such as women's reproductive rights; health care; humane and just treatment of immigrants and *all* inhabitants of this country; about responsible stewardship of the environment; about maintaining our alliances with our NATO partners, alliances which have held for almost 80 years – to mention any of these subjects can mark you in the eyes of some as a "divisive" speaker. And it is certainly not my intent, as a spiritual leader, to cause division in our community.

But what if we are like Esther? That is, if non-violent immigrants and U.S. citizens in Minnesota or elsewhere can be hauled off by ICE without due process (or worse, shot)...how do we know that they won't be coming for *us* next? Recently, the cover of *Moment Magazine* (a mainstream Jewish publication) pictured the US Capitol with a large cross on its dome, and the words: "The Dangerous Antisemitism Lurking in the Christian Nationalist Movement – and in the American Government." Of course, caring about *our own* well-being and safety should not be our only motivation for speaking out when civil liberties and other sacred promises of this nation are transgressed. We should care about what is right *because it is right*. And we should care about our neighbors *because they are our fellow human beings*, made in the image of God, just like us. We *are* our brother's keepers, and we are the *planet's* keepers as well.

I have attended more than one Holocaust memorial service featuring the poem below. The German Lutheran pastor, Martin Niemöller, penned these words in 1946, soon after the war, in condemnation not only of the many German intellectuals and clergy who held their silence during the Nazis' rise to power, but also of himself, since early on in Hitler's reign he had been a fervent anti-communist, an antisemite, and a supporter of Hitler. It was only when Hitler began to insist on the supremacy of the state over religion that the pastor joined a group of clergy opposed to the Nazi regime. (In 1937 Niemöller was arrested and confined in a concentration camp, being freed by the Allies in 1945.):

*First they came for the Communists, and I did not speak out
For I was not a Communist.
Then they came for the Socialists, and I did not speak out
For I was not a Socialist.
Then they came for the trade unionists, and I did not speak out
For I was not a trade unionist.
Then they came for the Jews, and I did not speak out
For I was not a Jew.
Then they came for me, and there was no one left
To speak out for me.*

As we prepare to swing our groggers and stamp our feet this Purim, blotting out the name of Haman, let us think of these words, and of the words of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and consider what in our own era is worth speaking out for. For who knows? If we keep silent for too long, there might not be anyone left to speak out for us.

The one thing we hope for is better in-person attendance. We understand that the recent snow and frigid temperatures make venturing out difficult, but we hope that by Passover both the temperature and time change will be conducive to coming to temple for services.

I am very happy to report that the Tree of Life is at our new home, and will soon be mounted on the wall in the function room.

We are still working to return memorial plaques to families, but we still have many, many plaques left. Rather than abandoning the plaques in the temple, we hope to bring them to the storage container we have at the cemetery. This is going to be a big undertaking, so if you or your kids or grandkids would like to help, please let us know as this is definitely a time when many hands will make light work.

We will now be printing the bulletin every two months, rather than monthly September through June. This will be a significant cost saving measure. Each issue will have the service schedules and yahrzeit notices for both months. As always, we will keep you updated via email.
