Comrades in Arms

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., born January 15, 1929—died April 4, 1968 Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, born January 11, 1907—died December 23, 1972

This Jewish year, 5775, Heschel's yahrzeit (18 Tevet) is Friday, Jan. 9th

Heschel's words from his address at the 1963 National Conference on Race and Religion, in Chicago:

"At the first conference on religion and race, the main participants were Pharaoh and Moses. The outcome of that summit meeting has not come to an end. Pharaoh is not ready to capitulate. The Exodus began, but is far from having been completed."

Soon after Martin Luther King's tragic assassination, Heschel spoke:

"Martin Luther King is a sign that God has not forsaken the United States of America. God has sent him to us...his mission is sacred...I call upon every Jew to hearken to his voice, to share his vision, to follow in his way. The whole future of America will depend upon the influence of Dr. King."

Some quotations from Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr:

"An individual has not started living until he can rise above the narrow confines of his individualistic concerns to the broader concerns of all humanity."

"Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that."

"Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly. I can never be what I ought to be until you are what you ought to be. This is the interrelated structure of reality."

A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

"How to Do Jewish"

A few weeks ago I arrived at the Baltimore Hilton very early on a Sunday morning for the three day conference of the Association for Jewish Studies that occurs each year around the middle of December. A mere fifty years ago, the number of Jewish courses being taught on college and university campuses was miniscule compared to the proliferation that has occurred from the 1970's on. Nowadays the conference is overflowing with panel discussions, with every ninety-minute time slot from morning until evening offering fifteen to twenty choices on subjects from Bible, Rabbinics, Medieval thought, Kabbalah, Hasidism, ancient, medieval, and modern Jewish history, Israel, Zionism, Hebrew literature, Yiddish literature, Jewish arts, and on and on. Hundreds of professors, graduate students, independent scholars and rabbis gather for it yearly.

From 1972 – 1976 I pursued graduate studies in Kabbalah and Jewish philosophy and continue to maintain a strong interest in those fields to this day, though I came to decide that academia was not to be my path. My first three years were spent at Hebrew University in Jerusalem and my fourth and last year was back here in the States at the University of Pennsylvania.

The tendency in academia is to maintain an objective distance on the material, which facilitates a certain kind of understanding of the texts. At the same time, the very texts themselves that I was studying were written from a deep drive to live a spiritual life, to understand one's place in the universe and how to live a sacred life – in short, how to "do Jewish" as deeply as possible.

For the last 2,000 years, Torah study has meant more than the study of the Five Books of Moses (what we call the "Chumash" in Hebrew). Torah itself literally means "Teaching" with a capital "T." Most of the above mentioned list of subjects would qualify as studying Torah and Torah study has always played a central role in Jewish life. Early in the daily morning prayers there's a small passage adapted from the Talmudic tractate of Shabbat that says: "These are the deeds which yield immediate fruit and continue to yield fruit in time to come: honoring parents; doing deeds of lovingkindness; attending the house of study punctually, morning and evening; providing hospitality; visiting the sick; helping the needy bride; attending the dead; probing the meaning of prayer; making peace between one person and another, and between husband and wife. And the study of Torah is the most basic of them all."

I was very fortunate to study with people who wanted to not only look at Jewish texts objectively, but also wanted to make them part of their life, in other words to seek inspiration in the words of our ancestors and to find ways to let them inform how we live. Cantor Shoshana and I have recently begun a monthly study session on Saturday nights that's part of a national project called "Chai Mitzvah." The project gathers people who want to deepen their commitment to Jewish practice, to Mitzvot. We study various parts of our tradition as a group, choosing different topics monthly. The individual participants decide what they want to delve into more deeply and make part of their inner life and their personal practice. There's a wonderful energy that pervades our meetings because each participant has a deep desire to learn and grow and each person's enthusiasm contributes to the feeling of community. Our last meeting was a good example. We began at the end of Shabbat with the beautiful ritual of Havdalah which separates Shabbat from the rest of the week in a similar manner in which we usher in Shabbat: we use a multi-wick candle, wine or grape juice, and add the element of beautiful smelling spices and specific songs wishing each other a good week and alluding to the special delight of the day of rest. After that, we lit our Chanukah menorahs, it being the fifth night of Chanukah. Since our topic that night was B'rakhot we studied various blessings traditionally made over foods, making the blessings as we noshed on the foods that fit each b'rakha (blessing). We discussed the meanings of the words and the overall practice of gratitude and mindfulness that reciting blessings are meant to cultivate. The camaraderie and our common commitment are very heartening for all of us.

In Psalm 100:2 it says: "Worship the Eternal One with joy." We want to find joy in our traditions rather than rote and habitual performance. When we have Shabbat services and the congregation is singing together, it enhances the experience for all of us. I know it does for me.

I'd like to end with two final thoughts from our sages, from one of my favorite Talmudic sources *Pirkei Avot* (which collects moral and spiritual teachings of ancient rabbis). One passage says: "When a person's wisdom exceeds his/her good deeds, to what may he/she be compared? To a tree with many branches but few roots. A wind blows, uproots it and topples it over. However when a person's good deeds exceed their wisdom, to what may he/she be compared? To a tree with few branches but with many roots. All the winds of the world may blow against it, yet they cannot move it from its place." And lastly: "It's not the theory that matters most, but the practice."

I'm writing these words on the sixth night of Chanukah which is also the winter solstice, and *Rosh Chodesh* (the New Moon). It's the darkest time of year - the days are at their shortest and the moon is all but invisible. Each night we add another candle increasing the light and each day now will add daylight. May our inner lights also grow.

Dear Friends,

As President of the Fall River Jewish Home, I am reaching out to our Jewish community members to make sure that you are aware of all the services we have to offer. We are still small, not for profit, and mission driven, but we are not the place you remember visiting years ago. Just read this issue and you will see what I mean.

In 2014 the Home earned a 5 Star rating from **Medicare** and was recognized by U.S. News and World Report as one of the Best Nursing Homes in America for overall care, quite an accomplishment. Then in May of this year the grand opening of the "List Unit" was opened providing dedicated care for short term rehabilitation and recovery for our community members. If, after being admitted to a hospital, it is determined that you will require a short term rehabilitation stay prior to going home, please tell the case manager-discharger planner who is monitoring your care that you want to go to the Fall River Jewish Home. You are allowed to be cared for at the facility of your choice. Since we are the highest rated Medicare facility in Fall River, you can be sure you have made a wise choice and at the same time the Home will be living its mission of caring for the Jewish community.

In 2015 the Home will undergo improvements to enhance the care experience for residents. I am asking that our Jewish community members consider making a donation as generously as you can to the Home. Contributions are tax deductible and your funds can be designated to a specific fund, or you can purchase a leaf on the Tree of Life in memory or in honor of a loved one.

Whatever you choose to donate, it will be used to ensure a bright future for the Fall River Jewish Home.
