A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

More than meets the eye

In the middle of December every year for the last number of years I've been attending the annual three day conference of the Association for Jewish Studies. It is an invigorating immersion in current research across the gamut of Jewish topics: Bible, Talmud, Midrash, Kabbalah, Chassidism, Jewish philosophy, Holocaust studies, ancient, medieval, modern and contemporary Jewish History, Israel, Jewish literature in Hebrew, Yiddish, and English, and the arts. It's a very intensive experience from early in the morning into the evening with fifteen to eighteen panels going on simultaneously in every time slot. This year was the 47th annual conference. It began in 1968 with maybe 40–50 people attending and this year there were over 1,100. Each 90 minute panel usually has three to five people presenting papers prepared specifically for the conference generally to share with others their current work and projects. Every evening ends with the screening of a Jewish film after a late supper.

The conference is international in scope with people attending from Israel, Europe, and South America, but with the vast majority from the United States. Ironically, though non-Orthodox Judaism seems to be losing members in the United States, the level of innovative and original studies and creativity has grown immensely over the decades to which this conference is a tribute and testimony. The conference makes it clear that different people are engaged in both Judaism and Jewishness in many different ways. For some people there is a love of Judaism, the religious traditions of our people and the sacred texts of our tradition. For others there may be a passion for Jewish knowledge without necessarily a fervent faith in traditional Jewish beliefs. There are still others who commit themselves to studying Jewish history or expressing their Jewish identity and passions through the arts. The main common denominator, however, is the commitment to their Jewishness. Notice I said Jewishness rather than Judaism. Some people are passionate about both their ethnic/cultural identity and the religion that has generally been a central component of that identity, but there are many people who are deeply involved, but not always with our religious rituals.

It is important to remember that Judaism in its origins is not a religion in the common Western definition of that term, but more like what Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan termed "a civilization." In other words, not only has Judaism evolved over the centuries, but it has always included much more than religious beliefs. At this point in our history I think that any way in which people are engaged

and committed to their heritage is valuable. We live in a society in which everyone who is Jewish is essentially a Jew by choice. People have the freedom to embrace their Jewishness or to reject it. What Judaism will look like in the coming generations is hard to predict. There will probably always be people who practice what they believe to be Orthodox Judaism (though that has a history too and is a relatively recent phenomenon) and the various other Jewish denominations will have differing connections to our traditions. It has always been my hope that people will make those choices based on study and knowledge. I had a professor at Hebrew University in Jerusalem who one day in class declared "there are no real epikorsim ("heretics") today - nobody knows enough." In other words he was saying that people who reject the tradition don't do it out of knowledge of the tradition, but rather out of lack of knowledge. He himself was not a traditional Jew, but he devoted his life to studying Judaism.

Not all study or commitment has to be through book learning. As I mentioned earlier, at the Association for Jewish Studies Conference there were regular sessions on the arts: novels, poetry, theater, and film. We live in a very visual age – the various visual arts have flowered greatly over the last decades, especially cinema. Here at Temple Beth El we've been enjoying -for over half a year now - monthly viewings of films that have some Jewish component. We've seen Israeli films, classic Jewish films such as "Exodus," newer films such as "Defiance," and most recently, "Woman in Gold." Every film has been excellent and each has been different from the other. Some films are comic, some are tragic, some are moving - and all have been really worthwhile. If you haven't already joined us, please consider doing so. The quality of the films has been very high and there are many more to come. They stimulate thought and expose us to parts of our culture and history that we may not necessarily be familiar with. Their virtues are many.

We can learn a great deal about American Jewish culture and "the American Jewish story" through watching how it is portrayed in films. We can come to understand Israeli society better through film. Cinema can inform us directly by what it portrays and indirectly by our paying attention to what it chooses to expose us to and how these topics are presented. There's a lot to explore together and it's a pleasure to do so as a community. The word "synagogue" is essentially a word that comes from a Greek translation of the Hebrew term "Beit Knesset" which means "house of gathering." Our monthly Temple Beth El Sunday cinema is a stimulating and entertaining new tradition of our gathering in community. Hope to see you there soon.


