A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

When we return the Torah to the ark we sing a prayer called *Etz Chayim Hee* which means "She (i.e. the Torah, which is grammatically feminine) is a tree of life." The prayer, which primarily comes from the book of Proverbs 3:17,18 in the Bible says: "She is a tree of life to those who grasp her strongly, and whoever holds on to her is deeply happy. Her ways are pleasantness and all her paths are peace." The third and last line of the prayer comes from another verse in the Bible (Lamentations 5:21) which says: "return us to You, Eternal One, and we shall return, renew our days as of old."

There are two different well-known melodies for this prayer, both of which are beautiful and stirring. These few lines convey within them so much of the intricacy of our tradition. A great deal of the *siddur*, the prayer book, contains passages or paraphrases drawn from various books of the Bible (*Tanakh* in Hebrew) put together in a seamless manner. Many of the prayers articulate our aspirations both for our relationship with the Eternal One and with our fellow humans. The themes of peace, love, justice, and affirming life are ubiquitous.

The spindles upon which the parchment of the Torah is rolled are called "trees of life" (atzei chayim in Hebrew) and the most traditional way of making the blessings over the Torah during its public reading in a service is to hold the atzei chayim strongly with both hands just as the prayer Etz Chayim Hee expresses it. The blessing after the Torah reading says that: "(G!d) planted eternal life in our midst" i.e. the Torah is our connection to the transcendent and the eternal. The verb "planted" again evokes the theme of the Torah as a tree of life. In fact the text of the Torah (our chumash) that we use during services is called Etz Chayim (Tree of Life).

Over and over our sages teach that both our relationship to the Eternal One and our relationship with other people are vital. In the Talmud (tractate *Yevamot* 79a) it says that among the three essential characteristics of the Jewish people is being compassionate (the other two are being reserved and benevolent). Notice, all three of the qualities are those that apply between humans. G!d is often referred to in the *siddur* as "the Compassionate One" (*HaRakhaman*).

Beginning in the Middle Ages a body of literature arose devoted to *Mussar*, i.e. ethical teachings. Interestingly enough, the most influential and important authors of these works were mostly Kabbalists, i.e. Jewish mystics. You would think that the mystics, being so focused on their internal spiritual life, might have been more likely to neglect their relationships in the here and now, but the exact opposite was the case. Essentially they emphasized what was already embedded in the Torah and Talmud in numerous places. In the third book of the Torah, Leviticus (*Vayikra*), 19:18 we find one of the best known phrases in the entire

Torah: "Love your neighbor as yourself" (*v'ahavta l'reyakha kamokha*). In the Jerusalem Talmud, tractate *Nedarim* 30b, Rabbi Akiva, probably the most prominent rabbi in the Talmud, is quoted as saying that "Love your neighbor as yourself is the most important rule in the Torah." We're probably all very familiar with the story of the gentile who comes to Hillel and asks him to teach him the entire Torah while standing on one foot. Hillel, as we know, responds with "do not do unto others what you would not have them do unto you." We often forget the remainder of Hillel's response: "the rest is commentary – now go and study."

Even the simplest-sounding statements at times can be understood on many levels. Part of the power of the Torah, as we discover when we delve into it, is how complex apparently-simple stories can be, and how much is conveyed in so few words. Because the Torah often has this veneer of simplicity, yet so often contains such depths, it can be studied throughout one's life. As we bring our increasing years of experience and understanding to it, we also find more depth in it - because we are now ready to. That reminds me of a quote from Mark Twain that I love: "When I was fourteen my father seemed so dumb I was embarrassed to be seen with him. When I was twenty-one I was amazed at how much he had learned in seven years."

Too often in Jewish life in the United States, our Jewish education largely concludes at the age of thirteen. Rather than that age being a significant milestone of maturity in a person's lifelong journey to greater engagement and understanding in Jewishness and Judaism, it signifies the virtual end of the road. Had we concluded our study of most other subjects at that age it would be obvious to us how much we were missing.

I want to conclude by returning to the theme of *mussar*, of ethics, in our tradition. There is an entire tractate of the Talmud primarily devoted to ethical teachings called *Pirkei Avot* (literally "the Chapters of the Ancestors"). One of its passages (1:18) makes a grand statement about existence. It says "The world stands on three things: judgment (justice), truth, and peace." Elsewhere in the Talmud (tractate *Shabbat* 10a and tractate *Sanhedrin* 7a) it says that "every judge who judges with the utmost truth is like a partner with the Blessed Holy One in the work of creation and brings the Presence of G!d to Israel." Justice, truth, and peace: three pillars of life. This is a teaching well worth remembering these days when too often we're confronted with a world that challenges and threatens these three pillars.

I want to wish everyone a happy, healthy, and peaceful 2018.

January Events:


