A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

It's Not Always the Things Around Us That Change, but How We See Them

Though according to the Jewish calendar we are in the year 5780, the Jewish people have only been around for a mere 4,000 years. However that's more than enough time in which to evolve a great deal and to change. There's a particular blessing we traditionally recite whenever we do something new in the year. That blessing is known by its first uncommon word: *Shehekheyanu*. The *Shehekheyanu* begins as every blessing does with the same first six words in Hebrew that mean that we recognize the Eternal One as the source of all blessing, as our G!d, and as ruler of the universe. We then conclude with the words I'm sure we all know: *Shehekheyanu*, *v'kiy'manu*, *v'higi'anu lazman hazeh* (who has given us life, sustained us, and brought us to this moment).

Every act, everything we do, every word we speak affects our consciousness. The more we do something consciously, the more we speak words honestly and with conviction and consciousness, the deeper the impact on our lives. Our tradition calls that doing something or saying something with kavana (intention). There's a well-known phrase from the Spanish/Portuguese Rabbi Isaac Abravanel (1437-1508) that "prayer without kavana is like a body without a soul." This doesn't mean that it is easy to pray, speak, and act with kavana. It's hard to avoid at least occasionally saying or doing things either automatically or without real intention behind it. However our kavana can grow with time if we cultivate it, if we try to be conscious of what we do or say as we do or say it. Of course, this is a lifelong task, an ambition to always be growing spiritually, deepening our experience and presence in the moment as much as we can.

In the month of January this year we finish the book of Genesis and begin the book of Exodus in our annual journey through the Torah. The book of Genesis begins with Creation and continues with stories about humankind before moving to the beginnings of the Jewish People through the lives of the Patriarchs, Matriarchs and their offspring. Genesis ends with our ancestors as essentially a small clan. Joseph dies at the end of the book and asks the Children of Israel to bring his bones back to the Promised Land when the time comes when G!d remembers them and returns them to the land promised to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. So much of Jewish history has reiterated that very wish i.e. that someday, no matter how many years we have lived dispersed around the globe separated from our ancient homeland, we might be reunited with the land of Israel. It has always been a central theme in our identity as a people. That longing to return to our homeland is found

daily in a number of places in our prayer book. Right before we recite the *Sh'ma* declaring the Oneness of G!d, we express our longing to return from "the four corners of the earth" to our homeland. When we recite the *Amidah*, the central prayer said while standing, we articulate that desire to return to the land of our origins.

In the very beginning of the book of Exodus we see the transition from a small clan to a people. In Exodus 1:8 it says: "A new king arose over Egypt who did not know Joseph" who then goes on to refer to "Am b'nei yisra'el (the people/nation of the children of Israel). At this point in the Torah, our ancestors are a people suffering in slavery and oppression in the land of Egypt. A couple of chapters later in the same Torah portion, Moses has his fateful encounter with the burning bush in which he experiences the Presence of the Eternal One in a lowly out-of- the-way bush. This shepherd who is "heavy of tongue" encounters via the humblest of plants the Eternal One. What a striking juxtaposition! From here begins the journey from primarily being a people to the embrace and development of the spiritual/ religious traditions of our people i.e. Judaism in addition to Jewishness.

The fact that we are beginning a new decade could feel like an arbitrary event. Regarding change and the passage of time, ten years is a significant number. So much in our lives and in society has changed over the last ten years and certainly over the last hundred years. Fall River has changed a great deal over the course of that time as has the Jewish community in Fall River. We've seen the most momentous events in the life of the Jewish people in probably the last 2,000 years over the course of this century with the Holocaust and the establishment of the State of Israel. There have been unimaginable changes in technology that have affected so much regarding the way we live. Yet with all of these changes, many things remain the same - the essential concerns for living a healthy and meaningful life have not changed. Despite all of our technological advances and conveniences, our lives can feel increasingly precarious. Humanity has the power to cure or prevent illnesses like never before, to solve problems or exacerbate them as never before, to understand the planet which we inhabit and to destroy it like never before. Every person matters just like every act or word we say affects our consciousness and therefore matters. We can attempt to align ourselves with that which greatly transcends us or ignore it all. While our powers and influence are miniscule in the grand scheme of things, nevertheless each one of us can make a difference. We can always strive to grow. Moses experienced G!d's Presence in the lowly bush. Other people might have merely seen just another unremarkable bush in the wilderness. It's not always the things around us that change, but rather how we perceive and understand



Gentleman's Agreement is a 1947 American drama film based on Laura Z. Hobson's best-selling novel of the same name. It concerns a journalist (played by Gregory Peck) who poses as a Jew to research an exposé on the widespread distrust and dislike of Jews in New York City and the affluent communities of New Canaan, Connecticut and Darien, Connecticut.

The film was nominated for eight Oscars and won three: Best Picture, Best Supporting Actress (Celeste Holm), and Best Director (Elia Kazan).


