A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

"To Praise, to Labor and to Love"

It is hard to write of "ordinary" things when we are living through such an out-of-the ordinary time. The momentousness of the events we have been reading and/or hearing of in the news over the past month – and the rapidity of these stunning events' unfolding – has been dizzying. (And, as I write these words, we are only just slightly more than half-way through the month!)

How does a community – whether it be our Jewish community at Temple Beth El, or that of the greater Fall River/Somerset community with its many cultures and faiths - maintain its equilibrium? Both Jews and Gentiles generally agree that "love your neighbor as yourself" is an ideal rule to live by, along with its corollary cited by Jesus in the Gospels, "do unto others as you would have them do unto you." The Jewish version of this latter teaching, attributed to the great sage Rabbi Hillel is just slightly different: "That which is hateful to you do not do to your neighbor." Despite their subtle differences, both of these teachings have this in common: they are both antithetical to the social Darwinist-type credo, "look out for Number One," or the attitude that we live in a dog-eat-dog world, and that each individual's primary aim should be to amass the most money and/or power over others.

Some might point out another famous teaching of Hillel, as recorded in *Mishna Pirke Avot* ("Ethics of our Ancestors") 1:14 that seems to echo a "me first" kind of philosophy: "If I am not for myself, who will be for me?" – but if we keep reading, we find that the teaching continues, "...but if I am only for myself, what am I? – and if not now, when?" What kind of creatures are we if we are only concerned about our own well-being? Virtually all the major faiths (as well as many of the "minor" ones) of the world agree on this – God created us as social beings: we need the support of one another, and we have both an obligation and an emotional need to be of help to one another if we are to live a life that is worth living.

There is a phrase in our *siddur* (prayer book) that I love. It is found in "A Prayer for Peace" in *Sim Shalom*, said near the end of the Torah Service:

...we have not come into being to hate or to destroy.

We have come into being to praise, to labor, and to love.

I think this is the answer to how we as a Jewish community, and how all of us as a nation (however frayed our national fabric may be at the moment) can "hold it together." By remembering that we have come into being on this earth...

To praise:How? Through prayer and hymn if you are "religiously"-inclined; but also, even for the "non-religious," through both the appreciation and expression (through creativity) of beauty; through the act of praising others for their kindnesses or jobs well done; through the tending of a garden, rejoicing in nature or music, literature or science, even in food and fashion. Appreciating, praising, being grateful, surprised (not taking even simple things for granted), by being amazed every day.

To labor: We all need purposeful tasks, overarching goals in our lives – whether it be a "job" or profession, a family or community role, a sense of a "higher calling" (serving God, or one's country, or even the planet) – laboring in this sense is not just about securing enough income or provisions to survive (although that is necessary for life to continue), but about finding something worth living for. Being social beings, we need to know that we are needed in order for our lives to feel worthwhile.

To love: To love and care for others – both those near and dear to us, and, in a more altruistic way, those we do not know, using our imaginative faculty to put ourselves into the shoes of those less fortunate, and, moved by both obligation and compassion, to try to help make their lives better. Of course we cannot right all the wrongs of the world, or respond to the plight of every person (or species, or cause) in need – we would only end up exhausted and penniless! How exactly to carry out this mandate to love is a kind of mysterious dance: there is a spontaneity and unpredictability to it, but somehow, we have to trust that however limited we may think our power to love this way may be, it does make a difference.

If we can do these things, it shouldn't matter whether some of us are "liberal," others "conservative" – we can make common cause as Jews, as Americans, as human beings sharing the same planet. Yes, it looks as though we as a nation indeed have some "rough seas" ahead of us. But I think, if we can remember these words – to praise, to labor, and to love – we will come safely through the storm.


Don't miss our **Annual Congregational Meeting** on Tuesday, **June 13th** at 7 PM in the Vestry.

SUNDAY AT THE JEWISH MOVIES

(All summer movies begin at 4:00 pm)

Sunday, June 25th: A Borrowed Identity (Israeli - 2014)

A bright young Israeli Årab boy, admitted to a top-tier boarding school in Jerusalem, struggles to blend in with his Jewish classmates. Finding himself pulled in two directions, he faces a life-altering choice regarding his identity. **Winner of "Best Feature Film"** at the Boulder International Film Festival; nominated for 4 Ophir Awards (Israel).

Sunday July 23rd: Defiant Requiem (Documentary - 2012)

A memorial concert reawakens the story of an artistic uprising in the Nazi concentration camp, Terezin, where imprisoned conductor Rafael Schächter and his chorus of 150 Jewish camp inmates fought back...with art and music. Through hunger, disease and slave labor, the inmates of Terezin held onto their humanity by staging plays, composing opera and using paper and ink to record the horrors around them. One reviewer writes: "This is what true documentary filmmaking should always be like."

Sunday August 27th Liberty Heights (1999)

"No Jews, dogs or coloreds," reads the sign outside a public swimming pool in 1954 Baltimore. High school freshman Ben Kurtzman (Ben Foster) and friends find themselves confronted with anti-Semitism, racism and coming of age in a fast-changing world. Writer-director and Baltimore memorialist **Barry Levinson** takes viewers on a sentimental journey, complete with loving period details and wry humor.
