A message from our Spiritual Leader,
Cantor Shoshana Brown

“Navigating these Confusing Times”

It is a cliché to exclaim “the year has gone by so fast!” – time has a way of doing that. But there are so many events of moment, both good and bad (some very bad), taking place in the world these days, we all feel breathless. We can’t keep up with the latest outrages in the news. The rise over the last few years of hate crimes against minorities – for the most part planned and carried out by individuals associating themselves with some form of “white nationalism” – has been one of the most alarming and worrisome developments that we encounter with increasing frequency.

It was due to the slaying of eleven Jews in the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh (followed shortly thereafter by the murder of two African-Americans in Jeffersontown, KY) that we held our interfaith service of “peace and solidarity” at Temple Beth El back in November of 2018. Little did we know then what would follow: the desecration of the Hebrew Cemetery here in Fall River; the slaying of 51 Muslims at prayer in New Zealand; the slaughter of more than 250 Christians in Sri Lanka, and subsequent reprisal attacks on Muslims there. Just this past week (mid-May as I write these words) I read about a mosque in New Haven, CT, that suffered a major fire now deemed to have been an attack of arson, and of two more incidents of likely arson, one a rabbi’s home in Arlington (which also housed a Chabad community center), and another of a Chabad center in Needham. (Thankfully, no one was hurt in any of these fires.)

It was prior to these last three events that the rabbi and I instituted the series at the temple, “Exploring the Faith of Our Neighbors.” Thus far, we have had two sessions (three by the time you get this bulletin), and they have been very well attended. And on June 17th, some of us from the Monday adult ed class will be taking a “field trip” to the Masjid Al Ehsan Mosque in South Dartmouth. I am delighted to be getting to know their community better.

It is a confusing time. Due to the prominence of new, outspoken Muslim members of the U.S. Congress, and to the political turmoil in Israel, with their recent parliamentary elections, political rhetoric here in the U.S. touching on Israel and its policies has become volatile. There are many accusations thrown around, much jabbing with sharp elbows. One side calls the other anti-Semitic, the other side calls the first abettors of apartheid. Republicans call Democrats anti-Jewish and anti-Israel, while Democrats voice suspicions of Republicans as being overly tol-

erant of white nationalism and neo-Nazis (and thus enablers of anti-Semitism).

What is going on?? While it is most likely true that anti-Semites exist on both the right and the left, it is obvious that the epithet “anti-Semite” (sometimes being used interchangeably with “anti-Jewish” or “anti-Israel”) has become a political football to be tossed around by politicians trying to smear their opponents, and also to court both the Jewish and the Evangelical vote. Liberals can usually be counted on to show kindness and openness to the Muslims amongst us (even while acknowledging that there are some very misguided and dangerous Muslims in various places around the world), while conservatives remain much more suspicious, ready to pounce on any word from a Muslim that seems like a criticism of Israel as “anti-Semitic.”

It is strange that the issue of Israel has become such a “funny bone” in American politics. Meanwhile, both Jews and Muslims in North America suffer an unprecedented surge of attacks at the hands of white supremacists, who hate both groups. We hear tales of Jews who show up to support Muslims, and of Muslims who show up to support Jews. Is it possible that we have these shadowy committers of hate crimes to “thank” for breaking the ice between the Jewish and Muslim communities? Because of these fearful attacks, we have begun to reach out to one another.

I think there will always be tensions within our Jewish community between those who have a more “tribal” instinct (we have to protect ourselves first – look at Jewish history!), and those who are more “global-humanitarian” in their outlook (the human race is going to sink or swim together – we’ve got to look out for one another!). Who is right? Each side has a good point.

It strikes me that in this era of fractiousness and pointy elbows, it is important for us to remember to take things slowly, breathe deeply, and try hard to understand the perspective of the other. I know that I am not always so good at doing this myself, but I want to get better at it...so this is a little plea for tolerance amongst us all. The problem is: tolerance can be difficult, so let’s also try to be forgiving on the days when one of us isn’t quite up to the mark. In the Torah God tells us: “be holy, for I am holy.” But in truth, none of us can be holy, we can only strive towards holiness. We may all be on different places on the road, but we are all fellow travelers, so let us be kind, patient, and forgiving of one another as we travel through this strange and confusing time.

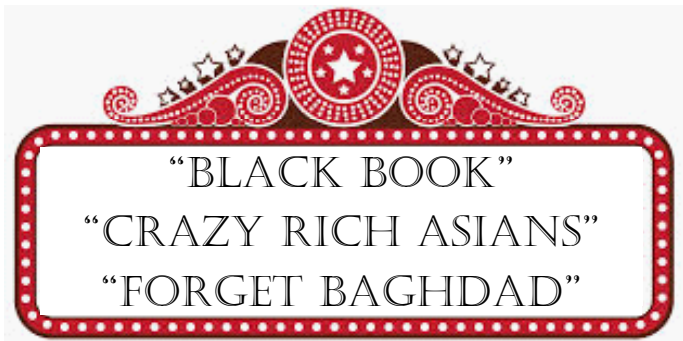

Thrust into the spotlight, Rachel must now contend with jealous socialites, quirky relatives and something far, far worse -- Nick's disapproving mother.

"Forget Baghdad"

In this documentary, Samir Naqqash travels to Tel Aviv, Israel, to explore the lives of Middle Eastern Jews. There, he finds a small group of Jews from Iraq who were forced to leave their home country, not only for being Jewish but for being communists. In Israel the members of the group face discrimination for their cultural and ethnic heritage. Naqqash explores their feelings of rejection, plus cultural stereotypes and the nature of the conflict between Arabs and Jews.
