
# Beginning Thursday, July 1st, Temple Beth El will be open for services!

## A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

"So much to Celebrate and be Grateful for"

As I sit at my desk about to write this last bulletin column before our two-month summer bulletin hiatus, my mind is aswirl with various topics that are worth addressing before our next bulletin (in September). I am hoping that this June column will also be the last one that is written during the coronavirus era, and that by the time September rolls around, we will have already begun gathering together for services in our chapel at Temple Beth El, and for other functions, such as adult ed classes, book group discussions, and mahjong. As I write today (May 23rd), the decision about reopening has not yet been made by our board of directors, which will take into consideration CDC recommendations, state and federal guidelines, and additional factors impacting our reopening. The most important thing, of course, is to prioritize safety; we do not want anyone falling ill with the virus because we rushed to get "back to normal."

It has been an unusual fifteen months, during which we have expanded our capacities for connecting with one another in new ways. Sometimes these connections have been frustrating — such as when someone experiences technical difficulties on "Zoom." It has felt strange to wear a mask when chanting the *El Malei* at a graveside, and to have to refrain from giving others a consoling hug. But now all of us in the Elber/Brown household are fully vaccinated (in about ten days Lev will have reached the two-week-past-the-last vaccination point), and we are immensely grateful for the work our scientists have done to get these vaccines out as quickly as they have.

Going forward, it is likely that we will incorporate some of the technology that we have learned to use during this pandemic – enabling some of our faraway members to join us regularly at services and classes. We are not yet sure what this will look like: services may become *streamed* regularly, but not "zoomed," since we don't want to have to be manipulating a computer during services when we get back to the temple; but perhaps classes can continue on Zoom...it is still a work in progress, so stay tuned!.

I recently took a two-day trip out to North Adams, MA, to visit my daughter, Mira, for the first time since last October. I had not really been on that long a road trip since that October trip, either. It was a wonderful change of scene, and the drive along the Mohawk Trail (State Rt. 2) was so green and so beautiful! Mira and I went hiking at two natural beauty-spots near North Adams – one along the "Cascades Trail," that follows a stream with small falls, ending at a larger fall near the North Adams/Williamstown line; the second at Natural Bridge State Park, which is the site of an old white marble quarry, and features water rushing down through marble glacial "potholes," conjuring a feeling of enchantment (the kind of place where a child might imagine

the fairies would live).

On my way home, I camped out at Tully Lake Campground (in Royalston, MA), very nearby to Doane Falls, a truly lovely waterfall that I hiked up to the next morning. Camping out in mid-May and in the middle of the week, I had plenty of solitude! It was a great experience to sit there at sunset in my camp chair by a campfire, looking out at the lake and hearing an owl hooting in the distance – and luckily, the weather was perfect! It was the first time I had ever camped alone, but I never felt lonely, and always felt safe. It felt like I was taking a "decompress" trip away from all of the intensity and worry of the past year.

Upon "re-entry" to the modern world of email and social media, etc., I caught up with what I had missed for those few days, and read a lot about the recent hostilities between Gaza and Israel. Certainly by now you also will have been exposed to many different perspectives on this situation. All I will say here is that it is a shame that so many people who do not live in that part of the world automatically go into their expected "corners," taking the side that they think their usual allies will expect them to take - without doing more homework, learning the history of the region, looking across the Middle East to see whether there are any other countries there which have a record on human rights/ democracy that can begin to compare with Israel's. Not to say that Israel can't do better...but then, what country in the world can boast that they have always done absolute justice all the time? (There were no Mohawk Indians to be seen on the Mohawk trail...think about that.)

We live in a complicated, sometimes dangerous, sometimes wonderful world. There is much tragedy and suffering in this world, and also much to celebrate and be grateful for. I am grateful that here in the U.S. (in New England, at least) we seem to finally be emerging from this pandemic; I am grateful that the cease-fire between Israel and Gaza seems to be holding (for now); I am hopeful for our nation as we are wrestling as never before with our own complicated history of racism and historic miscarriages of justice – but I remain worried about the toll of climate-related disasters both in our own nation, and about the health of our environment in general. But here in New England, there is still so much beauty – I hope you all can get out and enjoy it this summer. (And please note the TBE hikes I will be leading in June, July, and August.)

Please make sure to read my "News & Notes" for other events this summer. I urge you all to get your immunizations (if you haven't already), and I look forward to seeing you all in the fall – if not before!

Thank you all for your support and understanding through these many months of the pandemic – may we all meet again with smiles and *health* radiating from our faces!

### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Finally, the news I have been waiting to give you all! As of July 1st, we will be reopening our doors for in-person services. Thanks to the incredible success of the Covid-19 vaccinations, the world is opening back up, and so are we. The rule of thumb is that unless you are fully vaccinated, masks are required at all times while in the building. For those who are fully vaccinated, no masks are required, but if you feel more comfortable wearing one, by all means, please do.

We will have lots of hand sanitizer available, and we will keep the public areas clean, but other than that we expect things to be pretty much back to normal, although at this time we have no plans to serve food except at special events.

We recognize that many people who live out of town have enjoyed being able to attend services via Zoom. We are looking into what it would take to be able to offer live-streaming for all of our services, but unfortunately they will not be interactive. It is simply unfeasible for our clergy to lead a service in person and still control the Zoom meeting. Please bear with us while we determine the best way to go about this. We will definitely offer live-streaming for our High Holidays, as we did last year.

Please note that the Annual Congregational Meeting has been postponed until August. We will keep you advised as soon as we set a date. All congregants are encouraged to attend.

One important thing to note is that we must do everything we can to keep safe, in light of the recent acts of anti-Semitism. First and foremost, please do not wear a kippa outside of the temple building. Other than that, just try to keep aware of your surroundings. We will have extra security for the High Holidays, but in the meantime we just need to be cautious.

Sadly, we had to say goodbye last month to two long-time members of our congregation, Eleanor Lechan and Dr. Alex Friedman. Both truly served the community. On a lighter note, I would like to offer my congratulations to Lev Elber, son of Rabbi Mark and Cantor Shoshana, who graduated in the top ten from Durfee, and will be going on to Champlain College in Vermont. Congratulations also to Hannah Reitzas, granddaughter of Lois Reitzas, who was also in the top ten. Mazel tov! And a very happy birthday to Ann Chavenson and Sumner Alpert. Sumner just turned 95, and is now the longest living dialysis recipient in the state. Yasher koakh!

A Tribute to Eleanor Lechan

I was saddened to learn of the passing last month of Mrs. Eleanor Lechan. I was in her nursery school class in 1963-1964, and I'm sure I speak for generations of Temple Beth El students when I say that she was a beautiful person who perfectly embodied the Biblical quotation "Who can find a virtuous woman? For her price is far above rubies." She made a monumental, lasting contribution to the Fall River Jewish community through the love, care, and teaching she shared with generations of nursery school students, providing a warm, nurturing environment in which we learned about basic Jewish traditions and rituals, listened to stories, played games, did arts and crafts, sang holiday songs, took cozy naps on our individual blankets, and enjoyed cookies and kosher grape juice in tiny paper cups. I can still see the cubbyhole shelves lining the walls, filled with toys, books, crayons, games, candlesticks-and Mrs. Lechan's blue oxford shoes! Most importantly, she had an air of gravitas, seriousness, and purposefulness and a rare quality of making each student feel very special. When I returned home to Fall River to visit my late parents over the years, I always loved seeing her in the Temple pews at Shabbat services or on holidays, dressed impeccably with her pearl necklace and her dark hair piled in her signature bun. She always beamed at me with love and warmth, making me feel that I was capable of great accomplishments. I will always remember her with love and admiration. Now she is reunited with her beloved husband, Lenny, for eternity. May her memory be for a blessing.
