

Due to the timing of the Sabbath, Temple Beth El's communal Pesach celebration will not be on one of the traditional Seder nights of Pesach, but near the end of the Passover period, on Thursday, April 25th (the evening marking the beginning of the 7th day).

A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

When Adar Arrives, Joy Increases (Babylonian Talmud, *Ta'anit* 29a)

The Jewish calendar is a complicated one because it is essentially a lunar calendar adjusted for the solar year. What that ends up meaning is that over the course of nineteen years there are seven leap years. A leap year consists of an extra lunar month, Adar II, which precedes the month of Nissan (in the middle of which Passover begins). The reason for this is that Passover has to occur during the spring time, which was the season during which the original Passover and Exodus from Egypt took place. This year is a leap year and this month on the evening of March 7, Adar II begins. Purim falls on the 14th of Adar or the 14th of Adar II (if it's a leap year), which this year begins on the evening of March 20. If you look up in the sky that evening and the moon is visible, you will see a full moon. Two other complicating elements in our calendar are that Purim can never fall on a Shabbat nor can Yom Kippur ever end on Friday night (i.e. Shabbat).

The Book of Esther or the *Megillah*, as it's often called, is unique in certain ways. There is quite a comic element in it and there's a caricature-like component in some of the main characters. There's a lot of eating and drinking with no indication that Esther's dietary habits are different from the non-Jews among whom she lived. Does this mean that she was very assimilated into the Persian culture? She was embarrassed by her first cousin Mordechai's donning of mourning clothing upon hearing of Haman's decree to annihilate the Jewish people. Mordechai does not seem to be assimilated in the way that Esther is. Strikingly, he tells Esther that she is gravely mistaken if she thinks that her fate will be different from the fate of her people and adds that if she does not intercede on their behalf, their salvation will come from elsewhere.

So many themes in the story seem characteristic of Jewish life in the Diaspora for the last two thousand years. One element is the dependence of the Jewish people on the protection of Gentile rulers for their survival. If you look at Jewish history in Russia and Eastern Europe, the Czars and other rulers would allow the more downtrodden people in their countries to vent their anger, hatred, and frustration on the Jewish population rather than on the rulers themselves. Similarly in Europe during the Middle Ages, and later, whether it was blaming the plague or other misfortunes on the Jews, or simply always having a convenient scapegoat - the pattern is consistent. It's particularly striking that just as Mordechai warns Esther not to fool herself into believing that her fate will be different from that of her people's fate, many assimilated Jews particularly in Germany often saw themselves as German before they saw themselves as Jews (many of whom had fought valiantly in Germany's or

Austria's armies during World War I) and couldn't imagine that they would be the victims of so much hatred.

Unlike the vast majority of biblical literature, the story of the Book of Esther takes place in the Diaspora. In the Book of Daniel, which also takes place in the Diaspora, in Babylon, a point is made that Daniel will not eat of the king's food or drink his wine because of his dietary restrictions. This doesn't occur in the Book of Esther. Interestingly, in the ancient Greek translation of the Book of Esther, Esther does refrain from eating the forbidden food and wine of the Persians. In the Hebrew version of the *Megillah*, G!d is never mentioned, but in the Greek translation, G!d is mentioned and prayers (that don't appear in our *Megillah*) are said. The Dead Sea Scrolls, discovered beginning in 1947 in Qumran, contain at least fragments of all the canonical texts of the Bible with one exception: The Book of Esther.

The name Esther itself, if read as a Hebrew name, contains within it the Hebrew word "secret" or "hidden" (seter) and, of course, it is both G!d and Esther's true identity which are hidden. One of the morals of the story is that when Esther reveals who she truly is to her husband, King Akhashverosh, salvation comes. There is a Jewish tradition that contains within it the conundrum of the connection of Purim with Yom Kippur which is also occasionally called Yom HaKippurim. "Kippurim" could mean either "atonements" (the plural of Kippur) or "like Purim," so that Yom HaKippurim could be understood as meaning a day like Purim. That's quite a statement since on the surface the two days seem like diametric opposites - Purim is the most frivolous-seeming of holidays while Yom Kippur is the most somber. There is also a rabbinic tradition that says that when the *mashiakh*, the messiah, finally comes only one holiday that we currently keep will continue to be kept: Purim.

It is a *minhag*, a custom, to dress up in costumes on Purim and the central Mitzvot of the holiday are to listen to the reading of the *Megillah*, to give charity to the poor, and to give gifts of foods to friends and neighbors (*shalakh manos* in Yiddish or *mishloakh manot* in Hebrew) We always collect *tzedakah* on Purim at the *Megillah* reading.

I look forward to celebrating Purim with you, including the *se'udah* (festive meal) that Sisterhood will be preparing for us. One recent memory I have from a few years ago... I was sitting at a table with a few people noshing *hamentashen* after the *Megillah* reading, and it turned out that my costume was apparently so convincing that some people at the table didn't know who I was!

Wishing you all a happy and healthy Adar (I & II) and a very *freilikh* Purim!

Please join us on Wednesday evening, March 20.





Stay tuned for future talks on other faith traditions in April, May and June...




