A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

In Psalm 90:4 it says that "in Your sight a thousand years are like yesterday that has passed..." In other words, G!d's sense of time, in the view of the Psalmist, is completely different from a human one. Even from a human perspective, however, there is no uniform sense of time. I'm sure we've all had the experience of time seeming to accelerate with the passing years. When I was a child, the years went by much more slowly. It's hard to believe that it's already May. It feels like it was just September – 2013!! I remember, decades ago, trying to imagine what it would be like to reach the year 2000 – and now we're looking back on that millennial change from the perspective of sixteen years.

There are many days when I wish time would stand still. I'll look up at the sky or out at the ocean on a beautiful day and wish I could freeze that precious moment, but I try not to waste my time (as it were) hoping for something that cannot happen. I feel the same way with our son Lev - that the moments with him are priceless and each stage of his life so special that it's hard to not want him to stay at each stage and not outgrow it. However, the passage of time is inevitable and each new stage brings its own unique treasures. The key, I believe, is to be grateful for what we *do* have while recognizing that we cannot hold on to it forever.

Developing a true sense of gratitude for the blessings in our lives is invaluable. I see the *brakhot* (blessings) we recite in our tradition as functioning to both cultivate an awareness of ways in which our lives are blessed and wondrous, and affording a framework in which to express that consciousness. There are many less common blessings that we rarely learn about. Most people are familiar with the blessing over wine (and grape juice) or over bread, but we're not usually exposed to the *brakhot* to be said when you see wonders of nature like an ocean, great mountains, or a rainbow, or a person we care about that we haven't seen in a long time.

It is too easy to be so caught up in our daily routines and obligations that we can lose sight of all we could/should be grateful for. Traditionally there is a short twelve word prayer (beginning with the words <code>Modeh/Modah ani</code> meaning "I am thankful") that is customarily said as soon as we awake and which expresses gratitude for another day of life. A better known blessing that articulates thankfulness for reaching a certain milestone in our personal lives or reaching a special or sacred time such as a holiday is the "<code>Shehekheyanu"</code> which literally means "who has kept us alive" to reach this special/sacred moment.

In ancient days, prayer was more spontaneous

than it tends to be today. There was a traditional framework or skeleton of the prayer, but those who were well versed in the tradition would weave their own words around the customary framework. In Pirkei Avot (The Chapters of our Ancestors, a collection of rabbinic teachings from about 300 BCE to 200 CE when the Mishna was sealed), it says "don't make your prayer keva i.e. static or "fixed." Though most of us lack the facility these days to find the perfect words to give voice to our feelings spontaneously, impromptu expressions of gratitude or reverence also have a long illustrious history and are the original inspiration for many of our formal prayers. You'll find many Chassidic tales that speak of the superiority of spontaneous expression of one's heart and soul over the formulas of the formal prayers. Often these stories will focus around the heartfelt expression in any language (or even no language, but rather in some other form of expression like whistling, humming, or singing a wordless melody) and compare them as more meaningful than the "fixed" formulaic prayers of the learned rabbis.

The prayers that speak to me most, those I find most meaningful, are ones that express praise, wonder and gratitude for the miracle of life, and which help us cultivate an awareness of the eternal in each moment. Though we cannot stop time's progression and the inevitability of change, we can be grateful for the gifts of life we are granted. Each sacred season has its special flavor and significance which can add great meaning on many levels. On the social level it is meaningful to share these occasions with those we love; also, these occasions often convey with their special features the strong memory and presence of loved ones no longer with us. Finally, they work on us viscerally in a way that connects us with the very fabric of life itself. I'm sure many of us retain powerful recollections of Passover Seders that touched us and that come back to us every year at Seder time.

Eight verses after the verse this column opened with in Psalm 90, is another expression that speaks deeply to me: Limnot yameinu, ken hoda, v'navi I'vav chochma. "Teach us to treasure each day, so that we may attain a heart of wisdom." Truly words to live by.


Our next "Sunday Afternoon at the Jewish Movies" will be on May 22nd at 4 pm. The movie will be the award-winning Israeli film "Footnote."

CEMETERY HEADSTONE CLEANING

It's that time again -- our cemetery landscaper, Tommy Fillipovich, has once again offered to pressure-wash the headstones and foot markers using a biodegradable cleanser that won't damage the stones or the surrounding grass. The results are impressive, with the stones looking amazingly like new.

As setting up the equipment is time-consuming, Tommy has offered to do all of the pressure-washing in one day for a discounted price. Headstones will be cleaned for \$60 each, foot markers for \$15 each. In order to take advantage of the discount, we must receive your check no later than May 15th. Those stones that have been paid for will be clean and shiny in time for Memorial Day weekend. For those who miss the deadline, the cost for cleaning a headstone will be \$100, a foot marker will be \$25, and they will be cleaned at our landscaper's convenience. We plan to offer the discount day each May.


