### A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

This year Yom Ha'atzma'ut, Israel Independence Day, occurs on May 2. The month of May concludes with the first day of Shavuot. This confluence of holidays lends itself to reflecting on the connection between the two days. In the Hebrew calendar, they occur in separate months. Yom Ha'atzma'ut occurs on the fifth day of the month of Iyar, while Shavuot begins on the sixth day of the Hebrew month of Sivan. (This year Yom Ha'atzma'ut occurs on the sixth of Iyar – the day it's actually celebrated has to do with when Shabbat occurs). Though biblically Shavuot was strictly a harvest holiday, by Talmudic times it was associated with the receiving of the Torah on Mt. Sinai.

The Torah tells us that when our ancestors went down to Egypt to sojourn there, they consisted of seventy people. By the time they left, about four hundred years later, the Torah relates that the males alone above the age of twenty numbered six hundred thousand. (Various contemporary Biblical scholars question the accuracy of this number – but that's unimportant for this column). The question naturally arises as to when these people came to be a nation. Was it when they were standing at Sinai or was it during the experience of the exodus itself? The answer is not obvious, but in a way it relates to Israel Independence Day. One even more complicating factor is that what constituted the Jews becoming a people back in Biblical times, may no longer be the main reason that we Jews consider ourselves a people today.

I once read an article in an Israeli newspaper related to this issue of Jewish peoplehood. Its major point was that what defined a people was language and land. Certainly Israel fits that bill because we have returned to our ancient homeland where the Hebrew language has been revived as a spoken tongue after approximately 2000 years. But then we have to ask, weren't the Jews in the Diaspora for the last two thousand years also a people? In Europe before World War II, most Jews spoke Yiddish – so they had a language – and they expressed a longing to return to the land of Israel in their prayers.

Actually, the issue of defining what Jewish peoplehood consists of is just another way of asking "who is a Jew?" Do we belong to a religious group or are we a people? Personally I tend to define Judaism as the religious traditions of the Jewish people. That definition sees the centrality of the peoplehood which therefore includes those Jews who don't practice Judaism, but still identify as Jews. It also allows for different ways of practicing Judaism and therefore not insisting that there is only one "right" way to do so. There are Jews all over the world in every continent. Sometimes we forget that what those of us from Eastern European ancestry associate with Judaism and Jewishness can be quite different from what Jews from the Middle East, Africa, India, or China associate with Judaism and Jewishness. Foods that we think of as typically Jewish, for example, gefilte fish, is not a Sephardic dish, just like humus, falafel, jachnun, or shakshuka (all middle-eastern dishes) are not Ashkenazic dishes.

One of the striking things that I noticed when I first lived in Israel was how many different kinds of Jews were living there from all over the world. Next it's interesting to notice the differing customs from community to community. I find the food associated with Chanukah as a particularly good example. For Ashkenazim, latkes are the classic food. For Sephardi and Mizrachi (i.e. Middle Eastern) Jews, sufganiyot, jelly doughnuts, are the classic food. As different as these two foods are, they have one major thing in common associated with Chanukah - they're both made with oil and therefore relate back to the Talmudic teaching of one day's worth of oil burning for eight days. Virtually every Jewish community around the world has had its own language such as Yiddish for Ashkenazic Jews, Ladino for Sephardic Jews (from the Iberian Peninsula), and Judeo-Arabic languages for Mizrachi Jews. However, the one language we all share is Hebrew.

My first Yom Ha'atzma'ut in Israel was in April 1971. I was living in Jerusalem a five-minute walk from Heikhal Shlomo, the seat of the Chief Rabbinate, which is a large domed building. This was significant because incredible fireworks were set off from its roof three times that night and all the adjacent downtown streets were closed off to traffic. The streets were packed with pedestrians, there were vendors selling different kinds of foods on the street, people walked around with plastic hammers which made a sound when you tapped someone on the head with one – which many people were doing (the plastic hammer vendors did particularly well that night). The sense of joy and celebration among the people for the existence of the twenty-three year old state was palpable.

The few times I was there on Israel Independence Day there was also a great sense of solidarity among the people out celebrating. You truly saw the ingathering of the exiles that Israel was supposed to be - so many different kinds of Jews all celebrating the re-establishment of a Jewish homeland on our ancestral land, speaking a language that hadn't been a spoken language in 2,000 years. Those seemed to be much simpler times. Likely I was also less aware of the complications. There were very few settlers in the territories. The idea of returning the territories in exchange for peace was agreed upon by most people. There was much less of a division between the "religious" and the "secular" Jews then because the ultra-Orthodox had not yet become as large a segment of the population, and they lacked political power except in ritualistic areas such as marriage, conversion, and divorce. My first Yom Ha'atzma'ut was less than four years after the Six-Day War, and people still felt a security they hadn't felt before. Just as many people at Temple Beth El have strong memories that come back to them whenever they're in our building, I still recall those times on the streets of Jerusalem whenever it's Yom Ha'atzma'ut. This year on Friday evening, May 12 we'll be having a special Israel celebration evening at 5:30 PM in place of our usual services. Please celebrate with us in the vestry.

It is empowering to know that we are not alone in this world, and that others, regardless of religion or beliefs, will stand beside us on this solemn day, commemorating all the lives lost during the Holocaust. Thank you to Cantor Shoshana and Rabbi Mark for all the planning and coordinating they did for what I hope becomes an annual event. Thanks, too, to our visiting clergy and their congregants for taking the time on a Sunday to join us on this special day.

I also want to congratulate Zachariah Phillips on the celebration of his bar mitzvah. His family has long been a part of Temple Beth El, so we are delighted that he has continued the family tradition here at Temple Beth El. Mazel tov!

Our Annual Meeting will be held on Tuesday, June 13th at 7 pm in the vestry. I encourage all congregants to attend. If you are interested in serving on the Board of Directors, please call the office. We are always looking for new people with new ideas to help lead us into the future.

Lastly, I just wanted to congratulate Marie Twomey on her recent adoption of a new dog. She recently lost her beloved beagle to kidney disease at the



much-too-early age of six. She quickly realized that her house was not a home without a dog, so she and her friend drove to central Pennsylvania to give little Miley, (an adorable two-year-old "mostly beagle" who had a

#### **CEMETERY HEADSTONE CLEANING**

It's that time again -- our cemetery landscaper, Tommy Fillipovich, has once again offered to pressure-wash the headstones and foot markers using a biodegradable cleanser that won't damage the stones or the surrounding grass. The results are impressive, with the stones looking amazingly like new.

As setting up the equipment is time-consuming, Tommy has offered to do all of the pressure-washing in one day for a discounted price. Headstones will be cleaned for \$60 each, foot markers for \$15 each. In order to take advantage of the discount, we must receive your check no later than May 19th. Those stones that have been paid for will be clean and shiny in time for Memorial Day weekend. For those who miss the deadline, the cost for cleaning a headstone will be \$100, a foot marker will be \$25, and they will be cleaned at our landscaper's convenience. We plan to offer the discount day each May.

#### From Toledo to Jerusalem

# A Fire in the Forest: The Life and Legacy of the Ba'al Shem Tov

Next, we will journey to Eastern Europe with Conservative Rabbi Marc Soloway, who embarks upon a quest to understand why the Ba'al Shem Tov (known as the founder of Hasidism) is so revered by Jews of all stripes, from the most Orthodox to the most liberal. In this 2014 documentary, Rabbi Soloway interviews religious leaders and scholars from around the world, traveling from his home in Boulder, CO, to New York, Boston, London, and finally making a pilgrimage to the Ba'al Shem Tov's homeland, and to his grave in Mezhibozh in the Ukraine."Through stories and historical information, interviews with today's most important teachers and on-location footage, A Fire in the Forest shows us how the legacy of the Ba'al Shem Tov is still very much alive in our day and relevant to our daily lives" (58 minutes).
