The excerpts below are a small sample from the many notes and emails we received, many accompanied by donations, after the desecration in the Hebrew cemetery in March. The positive and generous response from people of all ages, races and religions, from all over the country and even Canada, was uplifting. It was an honor to be of assistance to Jeff Weissman and Congregation Adas Israel in the aftermath of the vandalism.

I am Father Ted Brown, the director of the National Shrine of Our Lady of La Salette in Attleboro. I was shocked and saddened by the attack on the Jewish cemetery in Fall River. The graves of all our beloved dead are sacred places and the desecration of the cemetery should be offensive to all people. The references to the Nazi regime and the Holocaust make the attack even more repugnant.

We at La Salette stand in solidarity with you. We reach out in friendship to you and if we can help with the clean up and repair of the grave stones, please let us know.

You are not alone.



With deep sadness I heard about the cowardly vandalization of the Jewish graveyard from the media. It is very heart breaking that the resting place for your beloved ones was disrespected. As a Muslim it is an attack on us and we stand firmly with you shoulder by shoulder.

You are not alone. We in Canada stand behind you and I urge the law enforcement to bring the cowards who committed this act to face justice.



An anti-Semitic event like this reminds us that it takes vigilance and appropriate follow up to make our communities safe, secure and peaceful. Cemetery desecration is especially troubling in that it both offends the living and disrespects the departed. Needless to say, the recent descration of the Fall River Hebrew Cemetery was a deeply troubling event for many of us.

As the owners of SouthCoast Marketplace, which is virtually across the street from the cemetery, we feel personally violated and would like to support the efforts to restore the desecrated headstones.

I read with sorrow and exhausted outrage about the defacement of your cemetery; yet another act of arrogance and ignorant hostility. Please know that the women of the Episcopal Community of the Transfiguration in Cincinnati are praying for you as you deal with this stupid act of vandalism and with the implicit threats it conveys.

"A Prayer of Courage and Consolation" (see page 7) by Rabbi Karyn Kedar was offered by one of the Rabbis present at the Interfaith gathering at the local mosque here in Cincinnati following the terrorist murders in New Zealand. I include it in case it speaks to you.

May you know the loving blessings of the One who loves us all.

I do hope they find whoever did this along with hoping for the safety of everyone there is kept. I enjoyed my visit and hope to return later this year as I retire. A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

In Praise of An Embodied Judaism

I often quote passages from Pirkei Avot (the Ethics of Our Ancestors), a collection of Rabbinic ethical and wisdom statements from about 200 BCE to 200 CE, because I find a lot of profundity in them. Pirkei Avot is one of the sixty three tractates of the Talmud, but one of the very few that does not have a Gemara that accompanies it. It contains six chapters and each chapter is divided into smaller individual sections each of which is called a Mishna. Just to further confuse you, the entire book itself is part of a larger collection called the Mishna. The term Mishna means, essentially, a teaching that was taught through oral repetition. In Pirkei Avot chapter three, Mishna twelve we read: [Rabbi Chanina Ben Dosa (a first century CE rabbi who lived in the Galilee)] used to say: "One whose [good] deeds exceed their wisdom, their wisdom will endure, but one whose wisdom exceeds their [good] deeds, their wisdom will not endure."

There's a complementary teaching in the same chapter in Mishna twenty-two by Rabbi Eleazar ben Azariah (also from the first century CE) which says: "One whose wisdom exceeds their [good] deeds, to what is he comparable? To a tree whose branches are numerous, but whose roots are few, and when a wind comes, it uproots it and topples it over.... But one whose [good] deeds exceed his wisdom, to what is he similar? To a tree whose branches are few, but whose roots are many, and even if all the winds in the world come and blow upon it, they cannot move it from its place." These teachings articulate a fundamental element of Judaism which is that Judaism is a very embodied path. Our tradition is not merely comprised of beautiful or inspiring thoughts or ideas, as one might encounter in a motivational tape. It is constructed around actions embodying those thoughts, bringing them into the world, making them part of our body's memory too, anchoring them in our consciousness through physical activity.

I'm writing this right after the first two days of Pesach which is one of the most embodied of all Jewish holidays, because the kashrut of Passover is its most central element. During the Seder, for example, we don't only speak about the bitterness of slavery, we eat maror, the bitter herbs. Having that taste of the bitter herbs is essential to the holiday. It becomes a taste connected to our cultural memory. Not coincidentally, we eat the main ritual foods of matzah, maror, and charoset right around the time we recite what I believe is the key section of the Haggadah: that in each and every generation we are obligated to see ourselves as if we ourselves had made the exodus out of Egypt. We eat the matzah; we clean the house in preparation for the holiday - trying to remove all the chametz, all the leavening, that exists in our domain. The preparation of cleaning is an important part of the holiday itself. Of course

the idea of freedom is crucial and central to the holiday, but if it remains merely a beautiful *idea*, it loses the visceral power that those of us who have experienced Passover in a more embodied way understand not only consciously, but subconsciously as well.

On Rosh Hashana we eat apples with honey, we listen to the powerful blasts of the Shofar, we throw the morsels of bread into the water at tashlikh to physically say goodbye to the previous year's shortcomings. On Shavuot (this year on June 9 and 10), it is customary to eat dairy meals and study Torah during the first night. On Chanukah latkes are the traditional food for Ashkenazim and sufganiyot (jelly doughnuts cooked in oil) for Sephardim. Not to mention the weekly eating of challah on Shabbat and wine or grape juice for Kiddush. I remember years ago while living in Manhattan encountering the phrase "gastronomic Jews" in a newspaper, which was definitely being used in a pejorative sense. Clearly if one's Jewish connection ends with one's GI system, there's a lot missing, but at the same time, Jewish foods that are associated with holidays or even with Jewish culture in general have the ability to connect us to elements of our tradition that touch us on a deep level.

Our ancestors understood the power of acting on and embodying our beliefs, not keeping them theoretical. It would be pointless to theorize about the benefits of exercise without ever exercising. The entire Jewish year is filled with examples of embodying our spirituality, whether through lighting candles to usher in Shabbat or holidays, making Kiddush, waving the *lulav* and *etrog* and eating in the Sukkah, etc. These physical elements of the tradition are present throughout the entire year. Other examples are the wearing of ritual garments such as a *kippah*, *tallit*, and *tefillin*, putting a *mezuzah* up on your doorpost, etc.

Those who commit themselves to Judaism, in whatever manner, will determine its future. Otherwise we abandon it to the people who do make that commitment. For guite a few decades now there has been a concern among non-Orthodox Jews who are deeply committed to our tradition that the number of seriously-committed non-Orthodox Jews is diminishing - while the Orthodox population is growing. This is not only true because the Orthodox have many more children, but a higher percentage of them remain committed. As fundamental as the ethical mitzvot are, i.e. mitzvot between people (mitzvot beyn adam lakhavero) without which we would be "empty of good deeds," the ritualized, embodied mitzvot connect us to deep roots and rivers that nourish our souls, that cultivate what I like to call "kishke consciousness" (and I'm not referring to stuffed derma), to a visceral connection to that which is greater than we can understand, and transcends our daily existence.

It is my fervent hope that we can all, both individually and as a community, grow together in our exploration of the treasures of our tradition.

The past few months have been an emotional roller coaster. In March there was the desecration of headstones at the Hebrew cemetery, which turned our lives on end. It was such terrible, disheartening news, but as you saw on the cover of this bulletin, the outpouring of support was incredible. As one person said, it was ironic how such a negative event could result in such a positive response.

Many of you know that Jeff Weissman, who is president of Adas Israel, also manages the Hebrew cemetery. While all of that was happening, he was trying to spend as much time as possible with his beloved wife, Janet, before she passed away on April 1st. Our hearts go out to Jeff and his family.

In the midst of all that was the vigil at the Hebrew cemetery, which was both solemn and uplifiting. The sense of solidarity was overwhelming!

Then our board member, Jeff Entin, lost his son, Jonathan, after learning he had cancer only a few weeks previously. We also lost members Sandra David, Dorothy Lurie and Irene Zwetchkenbaum, all in April, as well as Izzy and Tilda Schwartz's daughter, Suzi. Our sincere condolences to all of their families and friends.

Fortunately the sun is shining (some of the time), and the spring flowers and trees are blooming, which helps us feel a sense of renewal and hopefully lightens our hearts despite all of the sadness.

Please note that the date of the Annual Congregational meeting is Tuesday, June 11th at 7 pm. We encourage all of our members to attend.

TBE News & Notes

As this bulletin is being composed, we have just celebrated the first two nights of Pesach, with our home seders, and are looking forward to our community-wide **festive Pesach meal** on the 25th; by the time you read this, I hope I will have seen you there.

On March 26th, many of us were in attendance at the **Vigil at the Hebrew Cemetery**, along with approximately 700 members of the greater Fall River area – Jews, Christians, and, notably, Muslims, who themselves were feeling especially vulnerable after the shocking massacre of 50 of their fellow Muslims at prayer in New Zealand on March 15th. Donations poured in from many sources (including a \$5,000 donation from a Muslim foundation in Ohio) to help clean the headstones and repair any damage and to set up security cameras at the cemetery.

Exploring the Faith of Our Neighbors Series at TBE:

On March 26th, approximately 40 of us from the Fall River community enjoyed the first of the speakers in our series "Exploring the Faith of Our Neighbors." Our first presenter, **Mr. Martin Bentz**, (pictured with Cantor Sho-



shana) not only explained to us the "Five Pillars of Faith" of Islam, but also demonstrated to us a typical Muslim prayer-chant (which I especially appreciated). By the time you read this, **Rabbi Mark and I will have presented the Jewish installment** in the series (on April 30th).

On May 21st, Ms. Rochelle Sokoll (daughter of member Francis Sokoll) will make a presentation to us in this series on **Buddhism**.

On June 21st, our closing speaker will be the **Rev. Darryl Malden** from the Bethel AME Church of Fall River.

Other Upcoming Events at TBE:

Our **Yom HaShoah commemoration** will take place in the Vestry on **Wed. May 1st, at 6 PM**.

Our first TBE Nature Walk will take place on Thursday, May 9th. We will be exploring the Norman Bird Sanctuary in Middletown, RI. Meet in the Vestry at 9:15. Please bring water and insect repellant, and \$6.00 to pay the entrance fee to the sanctuary.

(Save the date for our June Nature Walk: Thursday, June, 13th, hike at Allens Pond MA Audubon Sanctuary on the Dartmouth Westport line.)

Please join us on **Friday May 10th at 5:30 for our annual "Celebrate Israel" Shabbat service/seder** (in honor of Yom Ha'atzma'ut – Israeli Independence Day, which falls this year on Thursday, May 9th).

May's TBE Jewish film, "Blessed is the Match" will show on May 19th at 4 PM (see announcement in next column).

Finally, don't miss this year's **Tikkun Leil Shavuot** – our "late night" Torah Study on the 1st night of Shavuot, **Saturday**, **June 8th**, **beginning at 8 pm** at the Brown/Elber home, 537 Walnut Street. This year's subject will be "**Is Democracy a Jewish Idea?**"



In 1944, 22-year-old Hannah Senesh parachuted into Nazi-occupied Europe with a small group of Jewish volunteers from Palestine. Theirs was the only military rescue mission for Jews that occurred in World War II. Narrated by Academy Award winner Joan Allen, the multi-award-winning BLESSED IS THE MATCH follows the remarkable journey of this young Hungarian poet and diarist, paratrooper and resistance fighter. Told through Hannah's letters, diaries, and poems, her mother's memoirs, and the recollections of those who knew and loved her (including two of her fellow parachutists), this 2006 film traces her life from her childhood in Budapest to her time in British-controlled Palestine--where she was drawn by the Kibbutz Movement that sought to build an independent Jewish state-to her daring mission to rescue Jews in her native Hungary. Both devastating and inspiring, BLESSED IS THE MATCH offers an intimate portrait of a singularly talented, courageous and complex girl who believed that one person could be a flame that burns brightly in even the darkest hours.
