A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

"A New Year's Journey Through the Torah"

I am writing this at the end of the holiday period which concludes with Simchat Torah during which we complete our annual reading of the Torah and immediately embark on that journey again. There are five *Shabbatot* (Sabbaths) in this month of November, and the Torah portions, all from the beginning of the book of Genesis, cover Noah and the Flood through the early years of Jacob. These are stunning portions filled with some of the most classic stories of the Bible. They are deceptively simple, by which I mean the episodes feel very familiar to us and we think we understand them quite well, but actually there is a great deal of complexity beneath the simple surface layer of the narrative as it appears in the Torah. That's part of the reason that our sages over the centuries found so much to say about them.

Our sages understood the Torah as a repository for all the life wisdom one could attain, as a well known rabbinic statement in the Talmud phrased it: "turn it and turn it, for everything is in it" i.e. it is inexhaustible in its wisdom and insight. The book of Proverbs in the Bible says: It (the Torah) is a Tree of Life for those who hold fast to it and all who uphold it find deep happiness." We have numerous words for "happiness" or "joy" in Hebrew – among others there are those that refer to temporary happiness, that is happiness that's the result of a specific joyous occasion such as a wedding, bar/bat mitzvah, or a holiday ("Simkha" in Hebrew) and then there's the deep happiness that one can experience in a life that is meaningful and fulfilling ("Osher" in Hebrew).

In our engagement with the early Torah portions of Genesis we encounter again the very human characters that fill these portions – both the non-Jewish ones, such as Noah, in addition to our patriarchs and matriarchs. Each person is depicted primarily through their actions, usually in a brief number of verses. The Torah almost never describes a person's inner feelings. However, the sages of the Talmud and Midrash often do describe the psychological states underlying these characters actions, in addition to fleshing out the actions themselves since they are generally described so concisely.

As an example, let us take the opening verse of the Torah portion named "Noakh" (the Hebrew for Noah)" "These are the generations of Noah, Noah was a righteous person (a tzaddik); he was blameless in his generations; Noah walked with G!d." Studying Torah trains us to be careful and critical readers in the sense of noticing the many nuances in the text. The opening phrase ("these are the generations...) is fairly common in the Torah, especially in the book of Genesis in which many genealogies are men-

tioned. However the phrase is normally followed by a list of who begot whom. This opening verse diverges from that pattern. Any divergence from a typical pattern calls out for an explanation, i.e. what is it teaching by its change from the common formula? A collection of Midrashim on Genesis from the fifth century C.E. called *Bereshit Rabbah* (Bereshit is the Hebrew for the book of Genesis) explains the significance of this unusual verse. It teaches us that the essence of the "generations" (i.e. offspring) of the righteous are their good deeds, as it says in the book of Proverbs (10:7): "the memory of the righteous shall be for a blessing" (zekher tzaddik livrakha).

The next segment of the verse says that Noah was a righteous person in his generations. The sages naturally inquired as to the significance of this phrase too. Some interpreted it as implying great praise. If Noah was able to be righteous and blameless while living among people who were utterly corrupt, he must have been quite a *tzaddik* (righteous person). Others interpreted it as implying that he was great only in comparison with those corrupt people of his generations, but if he had lived in the time of Abraham, he would not have been seen as all that special.

The comparison with Abraham is a natural one because Abraham, who makes his debut at the end of the portion Noakh, is the next main figure spoken of in the Torah. How do they compare as people and as leaders? Abraham is informed of a mini-version of the destruction that Noah would be witness to. Abraham is told that G!d will destroy the towns of Sodom and Gomorrah because of the utter corruption in those cities. What did Noah do when he was told that the earth and life upon it would be destroyed? He built his ark and took his family upon it and the animals two by two so they could start over again. What did Abraham do under similar circumstances? He argued with G!d asking what if there are fifty righteous people in the towns, would you destroy the righteous with the wicked? Abraham had the holy chutzpah to continue arguing with G!d saying: "Shall the Judge of all the earth not do justice?," what if there are forty five righteous people, forty, etc.

If we pause for a moment to look at the meaning of the names of Noah and Abraham, that also tells us something. *Noakh* means "comfortable," "convenient," or "pleasant." On the other hand, Abraham, whose original name was Abram (*Avram* in Hebrew) means "high (or supreme) father)." Abraham was a true leader, not just taking care of himself and his immediate family, but caring for people in general, willing to take risks for the benefit of others. The rabbis noted that though the Torah states that Noah walked "with G!d," when referring to Abraham, the Torah states that Abraham walked "before G!d" which they inferred as implying his greater leadership qualities and spiritual insights in comparison to those of Noah. May we find inspiration and new insights in our journey through the Torah in 5780.


CEMETERY NOTICE:




