If your headstone(s) could use a facelift, we have good news! Tommy Fillipovich, our cemetery land-scaper, has once again offered to pressure-wash the headstones and foot markers using a biodegradable cleanser that won't damage the stones or the surrounding grass. The results are impressive, with the stones looking amazingly like new.

As setting up the equipment is time-consuming, Tommy has offered to do all of the pressure-washing in one day for a discounted price. Headstones will be cleaned for \$60 each, foot markers for \$15 each. In order to take advantage of the discount, we must hear from you no later than November 15th. For those who miss the deadline, the cost for cleaning a headstone will be \$100, each foot marker will be \$25, and they will be cleaned at our landscaper's convenience.

## A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

Faith and Courage in the Face of the Future

Today I went down to One Government Center in Fall River to vote early. By the time you read this it will probably be just around Election Day. Who can predict what that day or the days immediately following it will be like? My hope is that, whatever the results of the election, the country will begin a process of healing some of the serious divisions and rifts that we've been witnessing of late, that people will recognize that for the sake of the greater good, we must find a way to listen to each other respectfully and seek ways to draw together. I've been talking about this issue for quite a while now.

November's Torah portions begin with *Vayera* which opens with a scene in which Abraham is sitting at the entrance of his tent seeing "three people" passing by who will give him a sense of what is in store for him. The month's portions end with *Vayetzei* which culminates with Jacob encountering angels just before he is about to return to the land of Canaan and re-engage with his brother Esau after twenty years. So much happens during the course of November's four Torah portions.

This month's Torah readings depict the early generations of the Jewish people. Just as we are at the beginning of 5781, the Torah readings are talking of beginnings too. Abraham is told in Vayera that he will have a child with Sarah in a year's time. We read that Abraham will become a great and numerous nation and that the nations of the earth will be blessed through him. In our tradition Abraham is seen by our rabbinic sages as the embodiment of the quality of *chesed*, of lovingkindness. The Jewish people, that is the descendants of Abraham and Sarah, according to our sages, are characterized by the quality of rakhmanut, of compassion (rokhmones in Yiddish). Right after the Torah speaks of the nations of the world being blessed in the future through Abraham, Abraham argues with G!d over the destruction of the city of Sodom claiming that if there are righteous people in Sodom, the Judge (shofet) of all the earth must act with justice (mishpat) and not destroy the good along with the bad.

There is an amazing amount of *chutzpah* in Abraham's arguing with G!d and he's quite aware of that, but that doesn't stop him from making his case. In one of the extremely rare moments in the Torah where we are exposed to the thought of a person rather than perceiving the person purely from the outside via a description of speech and action, we read of Abraham remarking to himself that he is but "dust and ashes" yet is addressing the Eternal Lord.

Of course, we are not Abraham, Isaac and Jacob or Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel or Leah, but the Torah stories are very human stories. We can recognize our own human qualities in the actions and characteristics of the matriarchs and patriarchs. They were not perfect people, they lived with struggles and challenges too. Abraham recognizes that he is but "dust and ashes." That is very humbling. Yet at the same time that does not stop him from arguing for justice with the "Judge of all the earth."

It is easy to feel that we are impotent in the face of all the challenges that we are presented with in our own era. Virtually every historical period has stood at some kind of crossroads, where important things in a society seemed to be at stake. The modern era is replete with moments like this, some of which are catalyzed by the increasingly rapid changes society witnesses. Strikingly, already back in the 1840s, the French poet Baudelaire spoke of "modernity" as "the experience of life lived in fragments, the swift pace of change in our time, fragmenting experience." If that was true then, how much more so is it true now?

Are we facing the fragmentation of our society with the divisions we see around various issues? Though the hurdles and challenges are great, there is also great opportunity that presents itself in challenging times. Individuals can make a difference, whether a small difference or a large difference. Along the way there's a need for an element of faith in other human beings and in future possibilities. Someone believed in the future of Fall River and moved here, started a business here, opened a school here. Someone or some number of people believed in the future of the Jewish community here in Fall River and built Temple Beth El. All these positive changes require courage. Someone or some group invents something, has an insight, or stands for something noble, uplifting, inspiriting and inspiring. Someone or some group stands for justice in the face of injustice, or compassion in the face of coldness and indifference.

At the end of this month's Torah readings, Jacob is about to see his brother Esau again after twenty years. The last time they saw each other, it didn't go so well. Jacob doesn't know what will transpire when they see each other again. He is frightened, but he knows he has to return to Canaan and confront his past and his future. It took great courage. In the past he ran away, but now he has grown into a person who will not avoid confronting what needs to be confronted. No matter how difficult and challenging things may be or become we can never afford to give up hope and conviction about the possibility of change - change for the better. Issues that may have seemed insurmountable at some point, have been overcome with commitment, patience, and courage to not give up in the face of challenges. That is as true today as it ever was.

What a strange feeling it is to return to the way things were before the High Holidays. The month or so after the holidays is always a chance to catch our collective breath after all of the planning and preparation that goes into making our services and holiday events so special. But this year it is different. Going back to being closed is so strange, and more than a little anti-climactic. Still, we feel we must continue to be cautious, particularly as the Covid numbers continue to increase in many parts of the country.

Thank goodness for Zoom. Rabbi Mark and Cantor Shoshana haven't missed a beat, and after celebrating Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah on Zoom, they are now adding the Monday morning Adult Ed class to their regular Zoom schedule. I feel badly for those who don't have computer access, but we are very happy to offer this safe and convenient way to stay connected to all of those who do.

I wanted to thank all those who made donations for seat fees for the High Holidays. We had several non-members come to services in person after RSVPing, and we also had several others who sent in generous donations who simply watched our services via live-streaming. We were happy to be able to share our services with friends as well as congregants from all around the country. We have never been able to say that before!

I would like to wish Beth Bark much luck as she moves to her new home in Florida. She has been a valued member of the board and we will miss her input. Thank you for your service, be safe down there in the Sunshine State and keep in touch!

Lastly I would like to thank Touro Fraternal Organization for picking up the tab for our police presence at the High Holidays. With the state of the world today it was reassuring to have them there, and having Touro cover the cost was truly a mitzvah.

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
#### TBE News & Notes

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
