## Rabbi Samuel & Tillie Ruderman Shabbaton Weekend

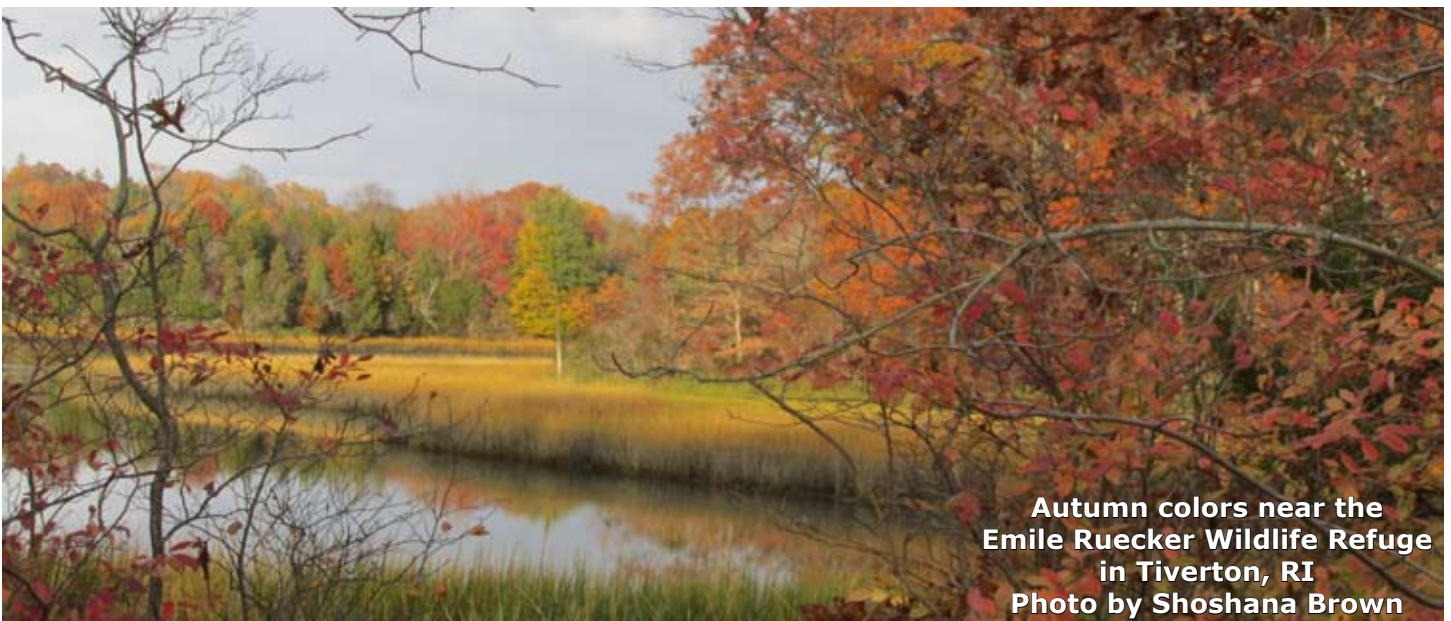
Friday, November 13th - Sunday, November 15th

## A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

### What Is the True Meaning of *Tzedakah*?

During a recent Hebrew school class, my students and I were discussing one of the signature prayers of the High Holy Days, the *Unetaneh Tokef*, the “who shall live and who shall die” prayer, with its dramatic list of catastrophes. In reality, however, I wanted to direct the attention of my students to the phrase that comes after this frightening litany:

*u-teshuvah, u-tefillah, u-tzedakah ma'avirin et-roa ha-gezerah*

But repentance, prayer, and *tzedakah* can avert the severity of the decree.

I have intentionally left that one word—*tzedakah*—untranslated, for that was one of the objects of our lesson: what is the true meaning of *tzedakah*? Is it simply giving money to charities, putting coins in the “pushke” or *tzedakah* box? The root of the word has the meaning of “justice” or “righteousness”: a *tzaddik* is a person who lives a “righteous” life, doing what is right and not living by lies or deceit. Over the ages, however, *tzedakah* came to be associated with giving to charities, and since I want to talk here about two specific ways that we can help others with monetary donations, I would like to examine why giving out of our free will is considered an act of justice.

Couldn't a person who works for his/her living, who has not cheated or stolen, who abides by the laws of the land, be considered “just”—a *tzaddik*—without necessarily giving to others in need? Do we owe anything to the poor or to others in need in the same way that we owe money to our credit card companies or to a landlord? The Torah's answer would be yes. We are commanded many places in the Torah not to neglect the plight of the widow or the orphan: certain rights were considered *due* to them by Israelite society, since they did not have the protection of a breadwinner. It was seen as part of “justice” that the most vulnerable of our community should be provided for. And there was a third category—especially in the Book of Deuteronomy—usually mentioned in the same breath along with the “fatherless” and the widow: that was the *alien*. Throughout the Torah the command to treat the alien with kindness and compassion comes up—more than any other command!—calling on us to remember that we too were once aliens in the land of Egypt.

It seems clear from the Torah that God expects human beings to care for one another: not everyone is born into good circumstances, we do not all have the same abilities, the same opportunities. Disasters befall people beyond their control. We cannot possibly give help to all who need it in the world today—but if we hug our wealth to ourselves without reaching out to try to make the world a more equitable place, a place with less poverty and less suffering—

then, in the Jewish tradition at least, we have not done “justice.” And this justice is expected of us not just towards our fellow Jews who are in need, but to the *stranger* (the immigrant or alien) as well.

Of course it is praiseworthy to help at home, too. Recently we have been asked for contributions to [repair the towers of our magnificent sanctuary](#), which is a very important cause. I would also like to direct your attention to two other causes as we head in to Sukkot—our Jewish holiday of thanksgiving. One is a new fund (see announcement on page 7 of this bulletin) that has been established by Robert Falconero and his daughter Marcie Nawi—with the cooperation of the American Jewish World Service—to help women and girls across the world. You might think that in our age of super-technology and “connectivity” all cultures would become enlightened about equality and human rights. Sadly, that is not the case; girls and women in so many places are denied rights, education, and the freedom to make choices about their own lives. [The Marcie Nawi and Robert Falconero Fund for Girls and Women Worldwide](#) will support many ongoing projects of the American Jewish World Service that focuses on this terrible problem.

Finally, I would like to make a personal appeal for [scholarship funds for an African Jew named Shadrach Mugoya Levi](#) who is pursuing rabbinic education through ALEPH (the same organization that ordained Rabbi Mark and myself). Shadrach comes from one of 8 villages of the Abudayan Jewish communities of Uganda (there are about 2,000 Abudayan Jews all total). They are extremely poor, but devoted, Jews—and in desperate need of a rabbi! Please see further details about Shadrach and how to contribute to his continuing education on page 7 of this bulletin.

We are living in a time of great need all around the globe. It can feel overwhelming. I recently encountered a teaching, attributed to “the Talmud” that speaks to this feeling. I had never seen it before. Apparently, this was a “fake” quotation—combining the wisdom of several different sources (Pirkei Avot, Micah, and Rebbe Nachman of Bratzlav). I hesitated as to whether to utilize an “inauthentic” quotation to close my bulletin letter, and then decided that what matters is not *who* said it, but whether it is *true*, and whether it helps us to do *good* in the world. And so here it is:

*Do not be daunted by the enormity of the world's grief. Do justly, now. Love mercy, now. Walk humbly now. You are not obligated to complete the work, but neither are you free to abandon it.* (Contemporary Jewish wisdom mashup found on the Internet)

Let us rejoice in Sukkot, the holiday of joy and thanksgiving, and let us be people of *tzedakah* so that all may taste joy in this world,

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*A Message from Atty. Kenneth Littman,  
on behalf of the Board of Directors  
(delivered to the Congregation on Yom Kippur)*

On behalf of the Board of Directors of the Temple, I would like to wish all of you a joyous, healthy and peaceful New Year. Last year during Yom Kippur I spoke about the many challenges that our congregation faces. I also spoke of the real gains made in addressing those challenges over the past two years, thanks to the hard-work and dynamic leadership of our Rabbi and Cantor and the persistence and determination of our President, Steve Silverman. A myriad of events continue every week at the Temple and participation in activities has increased. The Hebrew School continues assisting our children.

As we start the New Year of 5776, hope for the future is growing. The pervasive pessimism of the past is in the past and fading. The change in atmosphere, the new spirit that I talked about last year, a sense of determination to maintain our beautiful synagogue and expand membership and activities, requires the continued effort of each and every member of our congregation. Of course, maintaining the spiritual aspects are of prime importance to the health of our religious community. But maintaining the health of the building in which we gather to participate in such activities is also of great concern. Today we are faced with a serious building issue that must be addressed as soon as possible. The Tower on the southwest corner of the building has leaked for years and must be repaired to maintain the physical integrity of the building. After much research, the cost of repairing the Tower is estimated to be between \$25,000.00 to \$35,000.00. Despite the urgency of such work, we have decided NOT to raise the dues this year to pay for the repairs. Instead, we are asking each of you, if you are able, to make a separate donation to the Temple, designated for the "Tower Project", in honor of or in memory of a loved one, or simply in support of this essential project. Now is the time to act on this long-standing problem.

Finally, we are asking during the Days of Awe, this period of introspection, reflection and repentance to focus on the importance of rededicating ourselves to the needs of and the continued revival of our Temple community and to the survival of our Temple building.

Help Ugandan Jewish rabbinical student, Shadrach Mugoya Levi, pursue his dream of becoming a rabbi!

Shadrach lives in a very poor village in Uganda, Namutumba, in a community of 358 adult Abudayan Jews, with almost as many children. There are currently about 2,000 Abudayan Jews in Uganda—6,000 less than there were before the tyrannical regime of Idi Amin, which killed many of them between the years of 1971-1979.

Shadrach has been chosen by his community's aging spiritual leader, Rabbi Eri, to be the next leader of Namutumba's Jewish community. In order for Shadrach to pursue ordination, he has enrolled in the ALEPH (the Alliance for Jewish Renewal) Rabbinical Ordination Program.

Shadrach's village has no electricity or running water. In order for him to pursue his studies, he is dependent on the generosity of donors to help pay for his transportation to the U.S. for periodic ALEPH intensive study weeks; for transportation to and internet costs in the nearest large town (most of his courses of study are taught via electronic "conference rooms"); and for the purchase and shipping of his course books. While ALEPH has waived tuition for Shadrach, its leadership has reached out to its alumni to ask their congregations if they can help with some of these costs beyond tuition.
