A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

In the Wake of the Storms...

As I write this column, my laptop sits on a purple metal-wicker café table, looking out at a long hedge of rose-tinged late-blooming rhododendrons (at the Sweet Berry Farm in Middletown, RI – a place we enjoyed on our August TBE hiking outing). My wrought-iron chair is also purple, and it rocks! Across the way I see corn in the field, and to my right are peach and apple trees, with many apples already on the ground. It is a perfect late summer-early fall afternoon in Southern New England, and I feel blessed to live in an area where such places exist so close by (later, I will treat myself to a walk at the Sachuest Wildlife Refuge). Sometimes I have to take my "office" outdoors, away from the phone, from email, from all the hundreds of other tasks that demand my attention – especially now, with so much on my mind.

By the time you read these words, the High Holy Days will be over (although we will linger a while in the holiness of Sukkot). But as I write today, Rosh Hashanah is about 10 days away; I am anxious to review the prayers, their melodies and some of the less-familiar Hebrew texts that I encounter solely at this time of year. But like many of you, I am sure, I have Harvey and Irma, Houston and Florida, Barbuda and all the Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico and Havana on my mind...I feel so privileged to be sitting here in safety, surrounded by beauty. I am not rich, but I am able to afford iced coffee and a muffin at the café here, and I need not worry about going home to a house, or a whole town, that no longer exists. I try to imagine what that is like, and I can only think that it must be similar to the aftermath of a devastating war.

Some congregants have asked if the TBE community should collect bottled water, canned goods or diapers to send to these storm victims, but a little research indicates that relief agencies are much happier to receive monetary donations, which are much easier for them to make use of to fit the needs of particular communities. And by this time, I am sure that all of us have given what we could to one or more of these agencies, you do not need your community or clergy to urge you to do it. But there is something that I, not as one of your spiritual leaders, but simply as a fellow human being on the Planet Earth, do want to urge you to do: to give some thought to what is meant in the Creation Story in Genesis, when God says to the first human couple, "...rule over the fish of the sea, the birds of the sky, and over all living things that creep on the earth" (Gen. 1:28).

All my life, this passage of Scripture never made any sense to me: we cannot "herd" fish, nor can we "corral" wild birds. While you might say that we "rule" cattle or other domesticated animals, there is no way that we puny humans can "rule" over the creatures of the sea or the sky. In addition to not understanding it, I did not like what seemed to be the import of this passage – that homo sapiens as a species were meant by God to exploit the rest of creation, that all the rest of creation was made for us! Really?? So it is just fine if we destroy the habitat of certain species, or drive them to extinction, since they were made for us?

What a strange thing for the Torah to say, especially since peoples in ancient times did not have the technology to even come close to having such mastery over the seas or the skies! But now it is beginning to make sense to me. The seas and the skies are exactly what our last 100 years of burning fossil fuels and pursuing greater and greater technologies, and greater and greater luxuries in our lives have impacted. We have filled the skies with particulates and gases that have trapped heat near the earth; we have made the earth warmer, we have contributed to warmer seas, the warmer seas make hurricanes, tropical storms and tornadoes more likely; other areas get hotter and drier, experiencing more wildfires, which once again fill the air with smoke and ash...and who suffers first for this "rule" of ours but the "fish of the sea" and the "birds of the sky"?

If I could re-phrase God's speech, I would have the Creator say: "Behold all I have created; it is magnificent, but vulnerable. You human creatures have the power to protect it and nurture it. You also have the power to destroy it. If you want to know how you are doing, pay particular attention to those creatures that do not live alongside you like cattle or sheep: look to the birds of the air and the fish of the sea. If they are healthy and thriving, you will know that you are doing a good job as Creation's guardians; if they are ailing or disappearing, then you will know that it is time to examine your way of living upon the Earth."

Could this be what the Torah meant? It is my fervent hope that this will be the year that all humanity might examine its way of living upon the Earth, and that we might change course before more watery catastrophes, more wildfires, before more and more sea ice melts, before it is too late – for the sake of our fellow humans, for the sake of our children and grandchildren, for the sake of the "birds of the air and the fish of the seas" who have no say in the matter.

More about Rabbi Alvin

Rabbi Alvin Wainhaus, son of Holocaust survivors, was raised in an Orthodox en-

vironment in Boro Park, Brooklyn. A graduate of Brooklyn College with a degree in philosophy, he earned a Master of Education degree from NYU and was ordained at Yeshiva Beth Meir of Tel Aviv in 1972. Rabbi Wainhaus served congregations in Yarmouth, Nova Scotia and in Manhattan prior to becoming Congregation Or Shalom's first and only rabbi in 1981.



"Rabbi Alvin" is also well-known as a professional musician who performed and made numerous recordings with the late Hebrew folk singer Rabbi Shlomo Carlebach. Rabbi Wainhaus frequently incorporates his inspirational and traditional music into his sermons and services. He is fluent in Yiddish, and is a noted lecturer on Yiddish humor.

In addition to all this, Rabbi Alvin is a dear friend of Rabbi Mark's and Cantor Shoshana's who performed Mark's and Shoshana's wedding, presided at the bris of their son Lev, and also at their installation in 2013 at Temple Beth El. We are delighted to welcome Rabbi Wainhaus back to the Temple Beth El community for the Rabbi Samuel and Tillie Ruderman Shabbaton Weekend!




