

A message from our Spiritual Leader, Cantor Shoshana Brown

A Source of Riches and Meaning for Our Era, and for Life

As I write this bulletin letter, the date is September 23rd, but the whole bulletin will not be put together by our fabulous office manager, Marie Twomey, for another week or so, and then it has to be proofed, so it will take at least another ten days before it goes to the printer, and then gets prepared for mailing...you may not have realized how much work goes into the making of our monthly bulletins! The reason we are late getting started this month is that Yom Kippur was just over on the 16th, with only one "regular" day before Shabbat, with Sukkot falling hard on its heels. Last Sunday, September 19th, Rabbi Mark and I worked hard both getting up the framework and walls of our backyard sukkah, as well as catching up with long overdue vardwork that had been languishing while we prepared for the High Holy Days (our backyard was turning into a jungle!)...and then, having accomplished much that morning, we gave ourselves a treat: a drive out to South Wellfleet to walk on one of the National Seashore beaches (Marconi is our favorite), ending the day on a Cape Cod Bay-side beach, watching the sun set over Provincetown, while an almost-full moon was rising in the East. That almost-full moon reminded us (as if we needed reminding!) that Sukkot would start the next night. So the third Monday of the month, the day when I normally turn in all my materials for the bulletin, was a last-day flurry of preparations for Sukkot: shopping for the special foods we would be eating in the sukkah; getting the lights, decorations, and roof up on our sukkah (while our new custodian, Henry, was putting up the sukkah behind the temple); and Mark was assembling the lulavim that had been ordered for the temple, along with the willows and myrtle-branches, checking the etrogim to make sure they were all kosher.

To fully embrace and live out traditional Judaism, with all its holidays and special ritual practices is quite a lot of work! Nowadays it is rare to find Jewish families or individuals who feel drawn to the rigors of traditional Jewish observance: keeping Shabbat, all the Jewish holidays, fasting on the 9th of Av, keeping kosher, praying the daily liturgy at home or at the weekday minyan. It is probably fairly typical for North American synagogue communities that identify as part of the Conservative Movement, that mostly only the families of the clergy embrace all these practices fully. In areas with a larger Jewish demographic, you might find more Conservative "lay people" - who are actually day school teachers, religious school principals, and other sorts of Jewish "professionals" - who also keep many or most of these ritual practices; and if they have sent their children to Jewish summer camps, you invariably find more children who have fallen in love with the "enchantment" of Shabbat and the Jewish calendar, and who have parents who are willing to live according to these rhythms. (Note that with all of the days that need to be taken off to accommodate the Jewish calendar, it is no surprise that most of those who are doing so are working for Jewish organizations.)

The meaning and richness to be found in living according to the Jewish calendar, and in following daily Jewish ritual and ethical practices, is great indeed – but it is not *easy*, especially when not many other people around you live this way. That is why Orthodox Jews tend to cluster together, living in the same neighborhoods (with a *shul* within walking distance) – in this way, they feel the support of others who also keep kosher, keep Shabbat, build a sukkah in their backyards, send their kids to day school, etc.

But for many of us - including Rabbi Mark and myself the intellectual framework of Orthodox Judaism is one that we cannot embrace. We believe in modern scholarship, and that the Torah was compiled over many generations, the work of at least four different "schools" - moreover, that our sacred scriptures were ultimately written by human beings (some more divinely inspired, others less so). We believe in the full equality of women with men (and that this should be reflected in our ritual practices); we believe that no person should be seen as "less" or "other" on the basis or their gender- or sexual-orientation. We do not believe literally in the coming of the Messiah, or in the resurrection of the dead (although these ideas can hold life-affirming meaning). Moreover, there is an insularity to most Orthodox communities, a kind of fear of the "other" (or at least of non-Jewish culture) that most of us would find too claustrophobic-making to live with.

In this era of "identity" politics in America, we who identify as "Jewish" – but not Orthodox – may have a hard time determining where we belong. Are we Jews or Americans first? Adherents to democracy and the belief that all people are "created equal"? What comes first in our hierarchy of values? And what is "Judaism" if the vast majority of Jews do not practice it (in the traditional sense), or reserve their traditional practices to just a small number of days in the year? In Israel the majority of the Jewish population consider themselves "secular." So is there such a thing as "secular" Judaism? Most of us would answer "of course there is!" But how does one pass a "secular Jewish" heritage on to one's children or grandchildren, especially if one does *not* live in Israel? These are some questions I have been pondering, but do not have any satisfactory answers to.

One tradition that is *very* Jewish, but does not require great effort, is *asking questions*. As you will see in this October bulletin, there are no holidays this month, and because of the pandemic, no special events, speakers, or brunches going on at the temple. But we are still open for Shabbat services (either in person or on Zoom), and our adult ed Monday morning class is still ongoing (also in hybrid format), as well as Rabbi Mark's Hebrew classes. We don't have all the answers, but we remain a place, and a community, that welcomes questions and free inquiry. If you have not taken much advantage of TBE's ongoing offerings, we urge you to give us a try – you might just discover it to be a source of riches and meaning that can help you through this difficult era, and one that will sustain you throughout life!

Alvin, Andrea and Shafer came to our High Holiday services, and we hope to see them often. Andy and Pat Shulman live in Westborough and enjoyed the services via live-streaming, and they hope to come for a visit soon. Pat's grandparents were members, and her parents, Mildred and Al Brenner, were married here. Welcome all!

We have decided to upgrade our security system. The new high-definition cameras will be much sharper and we can monitor the system remotely, which is a huge improvement. If this is something you would like to contribute to, please note "Wish List" on your check. Thank you.
