# A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

In the beginning of August, Shoshana, Lev, and I took a twelve day vacation to the Southwest - one of my favorite parts of the country. Every section of the United States has its special attractions, but I find Colorado, New Mexico and westward particularly majestic. The grandeur and wide open spaces are breathtaking. Even the major interstate highways are stunning. We landed in Las Vegas and rented a car for our trip. When I was considerably younger, in the first half of the 1980's, I had driven across the country a number of times and to this day, driving through these parts of the continent remains extremely moving and pleasurable for me. Luckily Lev is a great passenger (and always has been). Every mode of travel affords its own unique perspective on the landscape whether it's driving, flying, biking, or hiking.

Driving out on the open road carries with it a certain sense of freedom, a sense of lack of limitations – you can go in one direction for hours and even days on end with no apparent constraints until you reach the Pacific Ocean. I believe that this is part of the ethos of the United States and its national mythology. The desire for freedom may be a universal craving, but I think it is particularly enshrined in the United States and I certainly imbibed that feeling.



There's a strong tradition which I love in the literature of this country that celebrates the quest to find oneself via an external journey which reflects an inner journey of self discovery whether it's Walt Whitman's "Song of the Open Road," Mark Twain's "Huckleberry Finn" or Jack Kerouac's "On the Road." In 1856 Walt Whitman begins his poem: "Afoot and light-hearted I take to the open road,/Healthy, free, the world before me,/The long brown path before me leading wherever I choose." In fact the very style of his writing, certainly the first instance of "free verse" in the United States if not in the entire Western World, embodied this yearning for freedom and self-expression because it cast off the strict rhyme and meter of earlier poetry. It was so ahead of its time that it didn't really take until after World War I and now the vast majority of serious poetry in the last 60 years is written in free verse.

Free verse wasn't always understood as having its own internal structures. For example, as eminent a poet as Robert Frost famously remarked that free verse was like "playing tennis without a net." This style of poetry, however, actually goes back to our Bible. The Psalms, especially, but also prophets like Isaiah and Jeremiah wrote unrhymed poetry that had an inner rhythm, but not necessarily a consistent meter throughout. Just as in literature, every art form in some way combines this quest for freedom, free expression and a desire to know the world outside and inside ourselves with the need for limits and restrictions.

Most of my life I have felt the strong tug of both of those forces - the desire for freedom to grow without boundaries and the love of the Jewish Tradition that abounds in rules. The tension between those two forces can be a very creative, productive tension or, if one side is too overwhelming, it can be stifling. I think most growth and evolution comes from the perennial attempt to resolve the inherent tension between these two tendencies. If the rules are too rigid and restrictive, they can squash the ability to create and revitalize because the rules become more important than the values they are there to promote and enhance. If, however, there are no rules at all, there can be no container or vessel to express the creation. In ancient rabbinic teachings about Creation we see how the rabbis try to teach these very lessons. There is a Midrash that tells us that many universes were created before our own, but they weren't viable. When G!d created the world out of pure unlimited love, (khesed, in Hebrew) there were no boundaries to contain this overflowing love, so that universe could not survive. The Midrash goes on to tell us that the opposite was also true i.e. when strict judgment was used to create the universe, nothing physical was pure enough to endure it. It was only when the appropriate balance was found between these two forces that our universe could survive.

I see the rules and regulations of our Tradition as there to enhance our lives. For example, many people nowadays see Shabbat as a set of restrictions i.e. I can't do this, I can't do that. However the Tradition says that truly understanding Shabbat enables one to experience it as an *Oneg*, a delight – as a freedom from all the demands of the struggle for survival, i.e. that one day a week we should be released from the burdens of the rest of the week. The rabbis speak of it as a taste of the Garden of Eden, a day of being in harmony with the natural world around us rather than trying to make it succumb to our will, a day to be free to cultivate and connect to the eternal elements of life rather than the ephemeral demands that drive us during so much of our days.

On behalf of Shoshana, Lev, and myself, I would like to wish you all a Happy Healthy Good and Sweet New Year Shana Tova U'metuka!!

Here we are again, on the threshhold of another new year, preparing for our High Holy Days. Has it really been a year since I last said that?

Rosh Hashanah will be here in just a few short weeks and I am once again looking forward to seeing so many friendly faces in our sanctuary. After a quiet summer it will be good to see activity in our Temple once again. If you would like to be a part of the holiday services in any way, please contact the office as soon as possible. We have aliyahs and readings, and we are always looking for ushers, Torah-bearers and ark-openers. We would like to involve as many of our members as possible, so please give us a call. A significant issue is the difficulty in safely getting workers up and down from there, so we will have to invest in either renting a lift or erecting large-scale scaffolding.

As you can imagine, this project will be very costly, most likely in the range of \$25,000-\$30,000. Despite the cost we must take care of this before the leaks get any worse -- it has already been put off for far too long. As you know, we have not increased our dues in quite some time, and we elected not to do it this year, either. That said, we would be very appreciative if you could send in something extra that we can put directly toward the cost of this project. Make a note on your check that it is for the Tower Project, in honor or in memory of a loved one, or simply for the support of Temple Beth El. We will have a special section in the upcoming bulletins for these earmarked donations. Every little bit helps, and I thank you in advance for your consideration.

Things continue to go very well with the school, Adas Israel, our staff, our spiritual leaders, our Sisterhood and our Board of Directors. We are very fortunate to have such a stable foundation, and I cannot say enough about the way everyone works together...what an amazing team we have. I would also like to welcome Daniel Schafler to the Board. My sincere thanks to each and every person who supports our congregation - there are too many to mention!
