A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

I am a great believer in the value of travel. When I was younger, I would travel with a tent and sleeping bag in the trunk of my car, making it relatively affordable. In addition to seeing the beauty of this planet or the great bounty of our country, exposure to people who are different from us is a huge contributor to opening our minds and expanding our understanding of life in general and what it means to be human in particular.

Back in the academic year of 1978 - 1979 when I was living in Manhattan I sat in on classes at Columbia University on Zionist history and theory. The professor was Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg who was a unique and unusual man who was also at that time the president of the American Jewish Congress and vice president of the World Jewish Congress. At one point he used the expression "the Coca-Colonization of the world," referring to the way that American products were spreading globally and how American culture was making itself felt throughout the world. I remember in 1970 when I was studying in Jerusalem seeing a huge Coca-Cola advertisement up on a building in Zion Square in the center of the city. You didn't have to be able to read Hebrew to recognize the words because the Hebrew was written in a script reminiscent of the English letters for Coca-Cola that we all recognize. Now there's a kosher McDonald's not far from there. As American styles and products spread throughout the world, the uniqueness of other cultures begins to diminish. The first time I went to Israel, via an Israeli ocean liner in 1960, you hardly saw American products there at all.

Certainly in our global economy nations are more interrelated and interdependent than previously. We can't isolate ourselves from the rest of the world; what happens on other continents affects us, and vice versa. People tend to fear that which is different or unfamiliar. But exposure to those different from us generally builds tolerance and understanding.

There was a great medieval Jewish traveler named Binyamin of Tudela. Born in the Iberian Peninsula, Binyamin lived from 1130 – 1173, and traveled the last eight years of his life throughout Europe, Israel, and other parts of the Middle East, Northern Africa, and Western Asia. He wrote about his travels and contributed much knowledge concerning Jewish and non-Jewish life and culture in those parts of the world and beyond. His book was originally written in Hebrew and subsequently translated into Latin and many other languages. Broadly educated and fluent in numerous languages himself, Binyamin preceded Marco Polo by more than a century.

Just as each language has its own unique music and expressions exclusive to the people from which it grew, each culture contributes something essential to our understanding of what being human is about. Each culture has its own

literature, music, art, mythology, history, etc. The more we are exposed to these elements of other cultures, generally the more we appreciate other people. The purpose of a "liberal arts" education is to help create broad-minded citizens who can function well in a democracy, who can learn to think critically while being open and exposed to the great ideas and creations of civilization. Though we all need to be able to make a living and contribute productively to society, who we are as citizens and how well we function in a democracy requires as much education as we can attain. Thinking critically is not synonymous with criticizing. Rather, it means being able to evaluate a discussion or position. Among the things I prize in Talmudic studies is the rigor of the thinking, the ability to examine discussions and issues from many points of view and the openness of the thought displayed in the Talmud. Even when some of the topics being discussed may no longer occur in the society in which we live, the process of logical examination itself is always relevant and trains people to sharpen their thinking - an inestimable tool, along with developing a compassionate heart.

Recent events make it blatantly clear that there are still many people in the United States who don't value openness to other cultures; nor do they esteem compassion. Narrowness and bigotry have, sadly, been a part of American history probably from its earliest days. The Jewish community has usually been very active in the pursuit of justice, compassion, and tolerance, drawing inspiration from the words of our prophets and compassion for others from our long history of experiencing persecution. Our tradition speaks of the need to have a "circumcised heart," meaning a heart that is sensitive and compassionate.

Coming up to these yamim nora'im, these Days of Awe, we are asked to make a kheshbon hanefesh, to take an accounting of our souls. Who are we as people and as a community, what are our values and ideals, and do we live up to them? It the midst of recent dismaying events, I find it helpful to recall the words of Robert Kennedy: "Some men see things as they are and ask why. I dream of things that never were and ask "why not?" Our ideals help direct our efforts, and we live in a time when our efforts are desperately needed. Every act of compassion matters.

In the Haftarah for the morning of Yom Kippur, the prophet Isaiah declares: "This is the fast I desire: to unlock the fetters of wickedness...to let the oppressed go free; ...to share your bread with the hungry...when you see the naked, to clothe him...." We will have bins in the entryway outside the sanctuary this year during the High Holidays to collect non-perishable food items to help alleviate the hunger of those less fortunate than ourselves. Please contribute what you can.

May this be a year of peace, health, and happiness. Shana tova umetuka! A sweet and good New Year.


