A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

The High Holy Days (or in Hebrew, the *Yamim Nora'im* i.e. "the Days of Awe") are rapidly approaching which in the Jewish yearly cycle means it's time to reflect on the larger questions in our lives. There are many cycles that occur in the structure of our tradition. There is the cycle of daily prayers that is attuned to the natural transitions of sunrise and sunset; there is the weekly cycle that revolves around Shabbat which our ancient sages termed "a foretaste of the World to Come" (i.e. of the messianic time of perfection). There is also the yearly cycle of holidays that generally are connected to both the natural world and the history of our people.

Within the prayers themselves there is an intricate structure meant to attune us spiritually to each day. The more one studies the sacred texts of our tradition and the more familiar one is with the prayer book itself, the more one sees the intimate connection between the two and the clearer the inner construction of the prayers becomes. I would like to speak of one early morning prayer that addresses both our concerns for the day as it unfolds and is also relevant to this time of year, this time that is meant as a period of soul-searching in preparation for the High Holy Days.

In one of the first prayers traditionally said in the morning immediately following fourteen blessings expressing our gratitude for various things, we recite the following: "Blessed are you Eternal One our God, who rules the universe, removing sleep from my eyes and slumber from my eyelids. May we feel at home with Your Torah, and cling to Your *mitzvot*. Keep us from error, from sin and transgression. Bring us not to trial or to disgrace; let no evil impulse control us. Keep us far from wicked people and corrupt companions. Strengthen our desire to do good deeds; teach us humility, that we may serve You. May we find grace, love, and compassion in Your sight and in the sight of all who look upon us, this day and every day. Grant us a full measure of lovingkindness...."

The prayer begins by being grateful to awaken to life again. Once we recognize the blessing of life itself, we immediately express a desire for a certain quality of life, a life of meaning and depth to carry us through the day. We ask: "may we feel at home with Your Torah and cling to Your mitzvot." May we live on a deeper level by connecting with that which is eternal and not just the ephemeral concerns that so often preoccupy us because of their necessity in sustaining us physically. May we fill our day with a sense of holiness and the doing of good deeds, deeds that both connect us with that which transcends us and deeds which help other people so that we are not living only for ourselves, but for our community and society in general. But

this is not always easy, so the next phrase expresses our desire to not succumb to "error, sin, and transgression." We may inadvertently do or say something that may hurt someone else. Even if our intentions were good, we may have been oblivious as to how what we said or did might affect another person. Our emotions and impulses might control us at times rather than our controlling them, even if we wish they wouldn't. In an analogy that I imagine a lot of people might be able to relate to – how often do we, for example, eat something that we know we'd be better off not having? Or have we followed an impulse to say something out of hurt or some other vulnerable emotion that we recognize would have been better left unsaid?

The prayer goes on to address one more negative challenge: keeping us far from wicked people and corrupt companions. No matter how good and positive one's nature may be, we still can be affected by a negative environment. It can influence us, however subtly, or it can cause us to react in ways which we wish we had risen above. Too often our words can be the source of other people's pain. Rabbi Israel Meir Hakohen, better known by the name of his most famous book, Chafetz Chayim ("Eager for Life"), a Lithuanian rabbi who lived from 1838 - 1933, was very concerned with proper language and avoiding lashon hara (derogatory speech - even if true). Speech is one of our greatest powers and treasures which can do so much good - imparting knowledge, touching the heart - but it has a shadow side too. Just as it can impart knowledge, it can mislead, just as it can move the heart, it can cause great hurt too.

The remainder of the prayer ascends through our wishes for doing good in the world, being humble, and finding grace, love, and compassion – three supreme states.

The entire Hebrew month of *Elul* which precedes *Rosh Hashana* is meant to be a time of self-examination culminating in the Days of Awe, a time to awaken our soul and rededicate ourselves to the most meaningful and good life we can lead. Consistent with this is the custom of doing a short shofar blowing at the end of every morning prayer service (except Shabbat), meant to remind us of and awaken us to this task of rededication.

There is a rabbinic commentary which interprets the inner meaning of the name of the month Elul as being an acronym for a well-known phrase from the Biblical book, the Song of Songs: *Ani l'dodi, v'dodi li"* ("I am my beloved's and my beloved is mine") referring to the relationship between God and the Jewish people.

As we prepare for these Days of Awe together, I would like to wish you all a Happy, Healthy, and Sweet New Year – Shanah Tovah U'metukah!

Fall River United Jewish Appeal Greetings for the New Year, 5779

Rosh Hashanah is a time of beginning and Jews look forward to an opportunity to start again. In so doing, we also take stock of what we have accomplished. We have rescued Jews from distressed lands, resettling them in Israel and America. We care for the vulnerable here in our Fall River community, in Israel and around the world. We revitalize Jewish life throughout our global Jewish community. We take on the obligation of Tikkun Olam – trying to repair the world.
