A message from our Spiritual Leader, Rabbi Mark Elber

It's hard to believe that, as I write this, we are quickly approaching 5782 in our calendar, with Rosh Hashanah right around the corner. Another year has transpired so rapidly. We never know what the future holds in store for us. My memory goes back to Purim in March 2020 when we realized we had to stop having in-person services because of Covid and we wondered whether or not to cancel our upcoming Passover celebration the following month, thinking that it all might blow over by then. And here we are, about a year and a half later and we'll be celebrating the High Holidays once again in a hybrid format with necessary precautions taken because of the persistence of the pandemic. As much as we try to maintain some element of agency over what happens in our lives, so many components of our lives remain beyond our control. We cannot stop time or slow it down. The march of history continues yearly, daily, even hourly whether we recognize it or not. The High Holidays draw our attention to this sobering reality.

Probably the prayer that emphasizes this fact of life most is the well known medieval piyyut (liturgical poem/hymn) called Un'taneh Tokef (or in the Ashkenazi pronunciation of Eastern Europe, Un'saneh Toykef) which addresses the unknown fate that awaits us in the coming year. The prayer's author is anonymous, though certain legends have grown around its authorship, none of them confirmed by scholarship. Its melody is haunting and stirring as befits the profundity of the moment and the theme of the prayer. Un'taneh Tokef uses the imagery of "the book of remembrance" in which all of our deeds are written, and repeats, as a kind of refrain, that "on Rosh Hashanah it is written and on the Fast of the Day of Atonement it is sealed." Though few people take the imagery of the book of remembrance literally, understanding it symbolically instead, the concreteness of the image makes it more powerful and helps it carry more emotional weight.

There are many layers of Jewish thought incorporated into *Un'taneh Tokef*. There is the philosophical strand that sees G!d as all-knowing. We may have forgotten some of our deeds, but everything is known to the Eternal One. The *piyyut* also speaks of the sounding of the "great shofar" on this "Day of Judgment." And immediately after that sounding of the great shofar, what is heard? "Kol d'mamah dakah," which I would translate as "the subtle sound of silence." Those three Hebrew words (often translated as a "still, small voice") are among the most famous phrases in the entire *Tanakh* (Bible). This phrase appears in chapter nineteen in the First Book of Kings in the *Tanakh*. Elijah the prophet (*Eliahu HaNavi*)

has just triumphed over the prophets of the false god Ba'al on Mt. Carmel (near present day Haifa) and has journeyed forty days and forty nights to "the mountain of G!d at Horeb" (otherwise known as Mt. Sinai). The short passage in the *Tanakh* says: "And the Eternal One passed by. There was a great and mighty wind, splitting mountains and shattering rocks by the power of the Eternal One; but the Eternal One was not in the wind. After the wind – an earthquake; but the Eternal One was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake – fire; but the Eternal One was not in the fire. And after the fire – *kol d'mamah dakah*" (the subtle sound of silence).

The experience of chanting the Un'taneh Tokef, and of hearing the piercing blasts of the shofar, are probably the most powerful moments in the High Holiday services. The blasts of the shofar are understood by our ancient sages as intended to awaken our souls to return to G!d, to retune ourselves for the coming year. As I've mentioned in the past, our tradition is filled with acts meant to embody our spirituality. We don't just speak of awakening our souls, we blow the shofar. We don't only wish each other a sweet New Year; we dip apples in honey as part of our celebratory meals on Rosh Hashanah. We don't only wish to start anew and leave our misdeeds behind; we walk to a body of water and perform the ritual of Tashlikh, symbolically casting our past misdeeds into the depths of the water in the form of small pieces of bread.

Every year on what our tradition considers the birthday of all of creation (as it says in the Rosh Hashanah liturgy: "hayom harat olam" – "today the world was created") we too hope for a personal renewal, a rededication to our values. The more we put into it, the more we get out of it. Though the forms of human society evolve, the major questions regarding the purpose of our lives and our most fundamental values endure from generation to generation. Among the most moving experiences in reading the *Tanakh* for me are those moments when I recognize how similar were the emotions, behavior, and characters of people thousands of years ago with those of people today.

As I mentioned in the beginning of this column, time passes so quickly, and change is inevitable. Personally, we are going through a change. Our son, Lev, is beginning college at the end of August. When we arrived in Fall River, he was ten years old, entering fifth grade at Spencer Borden. Now he'll be living on his own in college in Vermont. We want to thank our Temple Beth El community for having been so warm and supportive as Lev has grown up here. And we want to wish the entire community a Happy, Healthy and Sweet New Year! Shana Tova Umetuka!!

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

First and foremost I have to publically thank our old friend Tom Gregory for taking the time to come in and share his knowledge of the inner workings of our big and beautiful building with Henry Parker. Tom did a great job training George before he retired, but sadly George didn't have enough time to do the same for Henry. Tom has come to the rescue a few times since then, and when Rabbi Mark asked if we would erect our Sukkah this year we knew we needed to call on Tom once again. Not only is he helping Henry with the Sukkah, but he is now coming in to teach Henry more about the nuts and bolts (and the miles of pipe) that keep the building running. We are so fortunate to be able to call on Tom when we have questions, and he is always happy to help...even if it means shimmying through the ceiling of the sanctuary to change a light! We can't thank you enough Tom, for all you continue to do for our congregation.

As for the High Holidays, as you saw on the cover things will be much the same as last year. We successfully opened our doors to services on July 1st, and had high hopes of things returning to "normal" this fall, but the danger of the Covid-19 Delta variant has made us tap the brakes. Even before the Delta variant reared its ugly head we have experienced lower than normal attendance at our in-person services, but as we continue to Zoom the services there is a way for everyone to participate. For Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur we are once again asking for RSVP's. If you are fully vaccinated, masks are recommended but not required. Unvaccinated people (or those who are not yet fully vaccinated) are required to wear a mask at all times while in the building. Please spread out in the sanctuary, and leave your books in your seats with your name tag clearly visible. We will also be live-streaming the services for those who prefer to participate from home. A big thank you to Andrew Polin for providing the audio-visual equipment, and sending us a professional videographer from Presentation Technology for the live-streaming.

As this is clearly a fluid situation, we will wait to determine how best to offer Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah services, so please check your email for updates. At a minimum we will offer them on Zoom.

Just a reminder that we ask you to remove your kippa while outside the temple building, or cover it competely with a hat. Safety is our first priority!

I wish you all a happy, healthy and prosperous New Year, with better times to come. Shana Tova!

HIGH HOLIDAY SEAT FEES

As a part of the precautions we must take for the high holidays, all non-members must have a ticket in order to attend any of the High Holiday services. Our tickets are \$25 per person per holiday for the Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services, and must be purchased in advance. Please call or email the office by September 3rd for Rosh Hashanah or September 13th for Kol Nidre and Yom Kippur. Thank you for passing this information along to any non-members you think may attend.

HIGH HOLIDAY GUIDELINES

If you are planning to attend any of the High Holiday services in person, please RSVP to the TBE office by September 3rd for Rosh Hashanah, and by September 13th for Yom Kippur. Guests are welcome but must have a ticket. Please call the office for more information.

Due to the new Covid-19 Delta variant and the uptick in infections and hospitalizations, those attending in person are encouraged to wear masks even if they are fully vaccinated. Unvaccinated (or not fully vaccinated) attendees are required to wear masks at all times while in the temple building. And it goes without saying that if you have ANY symptoms of illness, please stay at home.

Please spread out in the sanctuary so you are socially distanced from other families in all directions, and leave your place card at your seat, along with the machzor (High Holiday prayer book) and tallis, so that you can return to the same seat and use the same items when you return for subsequent services.

As with last year, the services will be shortened, with no aliyot or congregational prayerleaders, and alas, no break-fast at the end of Yom Kippur! We will, however, have water and snacks in the foyer at the end of Yom Kippur.

There will be an in-person Tashlikh on the afternoon of the 1st Day of Rosh Hashanah. We meet at the Cove Restaurant parking lot at 4 PM; if you have not been able to come to services in person, but would like to hear the shofar blown in person, this is your chance! Rabbi Mark will bring his shofar to this event, and you will be able to hear the shofar blown live from the safety of your car - just let us know to look for you!

As for the holidays of Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret (with Yizkor), Erev Simchat Torah, and Simchat Torah morning (see cover for dates and times), all of these services will be offered on Zoom, and probably also in-person, but due to the fluctuations of pandemic conditions, we have to remain flexible in our planning. Please check your email and/or the TBE website for information about these services and for possible changes in our policies as we respond to the most up-to-date information about keeping everyone safe.

We are all so sorry and frustrated that we still can't return to "normal life" in our temple community, but the Torah dictates that we should always "choose life!" We do not want our gatherings to be the cause of any sickness or loss of life, G!d forbid, so we trust that you will bear with us until this difficult period has passed.

TBE News & Notes

Alas, in this uncertain time of the coronavirus pandemic, activities at the Temple (aside from services) continue in a modified manner.

We continue to offer all Hebrew classes (on Zoom) and our Monday morning adult ed class (although this class will be paused through Yom Kippur). As with Monday and Thursday weekday morning services, our Monday morning adult ed class can be attended either in person (held in the TBE library), or on Zoom. If you have never joined this class, but would like to join it in October, please leave your name and number (or send an email) to the TBE office, and the rabbi or cantor will get back to you about how to catch up on the book we are currently reading and discussing, Julius Lester's Lovesong: Becoming a Jew.

Resumption of other Temple activities (speakers, Jewish films, brunches, etc.) are on hold until the TBE Board of Directors determines that it is safe to hold in-person events for larger groups of people in the building. We thank you for your patience while we strive to keep everyone safe!

TBE Autumn Hike: Mark your calendars for an October hike at Allens Pond (a MA Audubon Sanctuary) in Westport on Wednesday, October 20th at 10 am. This should be an easy walk, and I will adapt it to meet the needs of whomever shows up. 

Seeking Former Scouts! Camp Noquochoke Reunion Sept 25th


For many years, Temple Beth El sponsored Boy Scout Troop 24, and most of them spent time
